NEWS OF THE DAY

Seventh Sunday after Trinity.—*Saints Francis, Stephen and Christina*.—*Jack Austen* novelist, died, 1817.—275 days past, 100 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Friday, the Message of the Executive soliciting authority to expel from the army the officers who signed the revolutionary manifesto was referred to the Military Committee. The text of the Message has not yet been published. A Message asking for the appointment of General Gregorio Castro as Member of the Military Tribunal of Appeal was referred to the same Committee. Discussion in detail had commenced of the Bill for the construction of embarking wharves for live stock, when the Council, which had met at an unusually late hour, was counted out at half time.

The problem of the Presidency of the Council is not yet solved, and the Council counted out on Friday in order to postpone it for another day. Sr. Federico Capurro, who is regarded with official favor, is the candidate of the majority of the "colorado" councillors, and Sr. José Saavedra is the candidate of the nationalists, the "colorado" minority and the constitutionalists, so that forces are pretty equally divided. Only a small minority are in favor of not accepting the resignation of Dr. J. C. Blanco. The knotty question should be decided in the next sitting, that is to say to-morrow.

Dr. D. Mendilaharsu has returned from Buenos Aires, and it is decided that he shall be succeeded in the Uruguayan Legation there by Dr. Gonzalo Ramírez—who, we hope, will show some energy in dealing with the conspirators there. It seems uncertain whether Dr. Mendilaharsu or Dr. Juan Pedro Castro will be appointed to the vacant portfolio of Foreign Affairs, but either appointment would be well received. These two, Dr. Salterain and Sr. Diego Pons are also candidates for vacancies in the Council of State. No other changes of importance are expected at present. The other Ministers remain firm in their posts, as also Prefect Domínguez, rumors of whose resignation are contradicted for about the fiftieth time, much to the disgust of the "collectivists" who so insistently set them afloat.

Matters seem inclined to quiet down, and for the moment there are no fresh alarmist rumors of importance. The only person now remaining under arrest in this connection is Com. Pereyra, who does not seem to have been able to give a satisfactory explanation of his appearance in the capital, and of whose doings and immediate antecedents the military authorities seem ignorant. All that is known is that he came from Buenos Aires, having obtained an official passage from the Uruguayan Consul there under plea of having been robbed of all his money Col. Mairet has been released from arrest. There is some talk of the Government redeclaring a state of siege in the capital, and if there is any revival of the alarming rumors, such a step would be judicious.

Yesterday's *Siglo* writes a reassuring article, in which it expresses confidence in the stability of the present situation, so long as the Government does nothing to alienate the popular sympathy it enjoys. That Julio Herrera and his friends are conspiring, is only natural and to be expected of them, but, thinks the *Siglo*, their power may be regarded as closed between the military mutiny of 1875 and the failure of the 4th instant. A new military movement in the city it thinks impossible, in view of the public anathema expressed on it. (This is all very well, but what do men of the character of Julio Herrera, Estevan García, Cerámula and Co., can for the public anathema? They have rarely known anything else.) A revolution in the interior is even less probable. It has been seen how little headway the recent "blanco" revolution was able to make, although it had the advantages of able military leaders, a just cause and very general popular sympathy. What, then, could be done by the detested and discredited "collectivists," against a Government supported by all the parties and by the conservative classes of the country? It would simply be a riot to be quelled by the local police, and neither Dr. Herrera nor the officers associated with him would obtain followers for so mad an attempt. Plots for the assassination of Sr. Cuestas and his supporters, may, thinks the *Siglo*, be equally dismissed as idle. Such things are not decreed in cold blood by a knot of men whose only banner is administrative plunder and the outrage of laws and Constitution, against a ruler who, whatever his shortcomings, is respected by the people. Political assassination, which is always a crime, may occur among a desperate people who have concentrated all the causes of their ruin on a given functionary, but it does not happen in an atmosphere of tolerance and sympathy towards the government. The thunderbolt falls from a heavily charged atmosphere, not from the clear sky. Still, it must be recognized, continues the *Siglo*, that although these rumors of plots and plans for a "collectivist" restoration, are more or less fantastic, they produce an undeniably alarming effect on the population, not unnaturally nervous after the outbreak of the 4th instant, and a depressing effect on the economic situation, as shown by the fall of values on the Bolsa, the restriction of credit, and the general dullness of commercial operations. This is the real evil of the rumors, and the Government should take steps to tranquillise the country before bad becomes worse.—What those steps are our contemporary does not yet explain.

Publication was made yesterday of the very lengthy report, and equally lengthy accompanying Bill, of the Finance Committee of the Council of State, relative to the formation of a "Charity Treasury" for the maintenance of the Caridad Hospital and other benevolent institutions under the care of the National Commission of Charity. This "Treasury" is to be formed by the income from the Caridad Lottery, calculated at \$250,000 the year and various minor taxes or duties and other resources, which bring the revenue up to \$531,000, against an estimated expenditure of \$530,000. It is pitiful to note that voluntary contributions and bequests only amount to \$2,000 in this sum. The part which will most interest our readers is that relative to Foreign Insurance Companies. The Executive proposed to raise the "patente adicional" on premiums from the present 2% to 6%, the Committee, however, are satisfied with proposing 4%, and propose a corresponding modification in the Law of Licenses (*Patentes*). Seeing the mania there is in South American Republics for persecuting Foreign Insurance Companies, this will probably be approved by the Council of State—and the Companies may be thankful that it is not worse. Life and agricultural premiums are not to be included in the new tax.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law suppressing the "Office of official Registry." As a matter of fact it has been suppressed since March 1st.

Although it is some ten days since the Law reducing the postal tariff was promulgated, the Post Office has neglected to put into force, pleading want of 1/2 cent stamps, and the Postmaster General has now issued a decree which practically annuls the law as regards papers under 100 grammes weight, that is to say the majority of news papers which it was the special object of the Law to benefit. This plain disregard of the Law has raised a great outcry, and the Minister of Justice will be asked to call the P. M. G. to order. Knowing that the Law was about to be passed, it was the duty of the P. O. to have provided the proper stamps.

Wise Remarks from the "Buenos Aires Herald"

—Every day the papers are filled with accounts of the most atrocious murders and robberies, and all manner of crimes of violence, but the same journals do not state that any person has been punished according to the laws of the country. Said an eminent Argentine, not long since—"Our laws are made for the protection of all manner of crimes and criminals, while law-abiding people are left with scant protection; and what he said was true. It is a scandal that our Courts are made the sure refuge of cut-throats, robbers, murderers, and other vermin, and there is no punishment to fit the crime" in any case, especially if the criminal has friends. We heard a man refer to a murder in the suburbs by saying of the murderer—"He will be all right, for he has So-and-So for a relative, and he will get him off." This is the universal opinion, and, as a matter of course, there is a terrible incentive to crime. It is no slander to say that the entire system of Justice as administered in this Republic is a disgrace to a civilized people, and would not honour the Middle Ages; in fact it is a belated survival of those times. There is no hope of reform, because Congress is composed of lawyers, and lawyers were never yet promoters of a reform of any sort, but have always yielded to overwhelming pressure from without.

—It seems to British people very disgusting that a handsome English lady cannot reside in this country without native newspapers making fulsome remarks and printing uncalled-for descriptions of her beauty, as if she were a professional actress or public personage. It is also going too far when a native paper says that all the Englishmen of a certain town are madly in love with her. It is not the rule for English gentlemen to fall madly in love with other men's wives. If things go on like this much longer European ladies will have to take a hint from their Asiatic cousins and wear veils to avoid the immodest and almost indecent attentions of native journalists.

—What a jolly picnic of it our troops will have in time of war, when in time of perfect peace they are left without pay, without clothing, with bad food and little of it, no sanitary staff corps and no medicine! At this rate, in time of war they would have no arms, no ammunition, and only a large supply of bullying officers and of graves.

The Advent of the Dynamite Gun.

The New York papers contain sensational accounts of the effects of the fire from the dynamite guns of the United States warship *Vesuvius* at Santiago.

According to the stories in circulation, three shells were fired from each of the three guns at a range, one paper says, of a mile; another journal reports half a mile. According to one account, each shell contained 500 lb. of dynamite; according to another, 200 lb. of gun cotton.

"There was no flash, there was no smoke, there was no noise (says the *Telegraph* message). The pneumatic guns on the little cruiser did her work silently. The first shot exploded on the hillside below the battery, the second struck close to the Spanish position, the third load of gun cotton was dropped on the very crest of the hill from which the battery was being fired the other day. A few seconds after the gun was fired there was a frightful convulsion on the land and the hill where the Spanish guns had withstood the missiles of the ordinary ships of war. Tons of rocky soil rose high in the air. The land was smitten as by an earthquake. Terrible echoes rolled around and around through shaken hills and mountains. The sea seemed to tremble with the awful shock. The dust grew into huge clouds and hid the scene of destruction. Then came silence, and next another frightful upheaval, and following it a third, so quickly that the results of the work of two mingled in mid-air."

The *Mail's* report is—"The first shell exploded below a new battery, the second near a Spanish encampment, the third dropped into the bay in proximity to the torpedo boats supposed to be lying there. The shots were fired without any flash, smoke, or noise, and produced frightful effects, closely resembling an earthquake. The two shells which exploded on the land hurled tons of rock and soil 200 ft. skywards. The echo of the explosions was terrible and the destruction widespread. The shock was tremendous even the distant warships trembling. The extent of the damage is unknown, but evidently is enormous. The *Vesuvius* will be extensively employed hereafter."

The *Morning Leader's* account says: "The naval authorities are greatly pleased with the performance of the dynamite gunboat which has demonstrated that large masses of high explosives can be safely

and accurately thrown. The effect of the explosion on contact was simply terrific, the concussion being distinctly felt on the ships five miles out at sea."

A Central News telegram from Kingston says:—One shell from the dynamite gunboat *Vesuvius* struck one of the defences on the island of Smith Cay, with most astounding results. It was exceptionally well placed, and when the shell exploded a cavity was blown out of the island large enough to contain a three-storied house."

It may now be mentioned that the *Times* correspondent in New York states that "military authorities discredit the exaggerated statements in the Press despatches; the accounts of the effect of the dynamite shells discharged by the *Vesuvius* at Santiago are not yet verified."—*Exchange*.

In *Cléopatra* in the scene where the queen is reclining on the couch, a footstool should be placed near her feet. Bernhardt was a terrible stickler for all these little stage details, and she never let the curtain go up until she had carefully looked the stage over. Well, on this particular night she took a step or two from the wings and ran her eye over the props. Instantly she noticed that the stool was at the head of the couch instead of the foot. She had had her own stage manager with her, and as she raised her head in her usually queenly way she immediately located him. He was standing at the opposite side with a sickly smile on his face, rubbing his hands nervously together. Sarah made three tiger strides, and grasping that stool by a leg, flung it quickly at the stage manager's head. Like the less-gifted of her sex, the divine Sarah was a bad thrower. The stool missed the stage manager, and one of the hands caught it as it flew to one side. He ran and placed it properly, and the play went on."

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, JUNE 24.

The landing of General Shafter's army was safely effected at Baiquiri in Cuba on Wednesday.

Heavy sentences were passed at Milan yesterday on several journalists tried for complicity in the recent revolutionary movement in that city.

A Capetown Correspondent telegraphs that the Government was defeated yesterday on Mr. Schreiner's resolution expressing want of confidence in the Ministry by majority of 41 to 36 votes.

The House of Lords was sitting for rather more than an hour yesterday. The Finance Bill was read a second time and afterwards passed through the remaining stages.

A new writ for the city of Durham was moved in the House of Commons. A number of water Bills were advanced a stage, proposed new clauses suggested by the President of the Local Government Board proving an acceptable and being withdrawn.

Just before noon yesterday the result of the poll in East Herts was declared, the figures being: Mr. E. Cecil (C) 4,118; Mr. C. R. Spencer (L) 3,850; majority, 268.

The Navy League had a conference at the United Service Institution yesterday on the condition of our ships, armaments, coaling stations, and food supply in the event of war.

The annual meeting of the Council of the Women's Liberal Federation was brought to a close yesterday. Among the subjects discussed were Vaccination, Temperance, and Education Reform.

At a meeting to celebrate Dr. Parker's jubilee as a preacher, held at the City Temple yesterday, congratulatory and eulogistic speeches were made by several representative Nonconformists.

Dr. Guinness Rogers gave a lecture yesterday afternoon at the Memorial Hall on the Ritualistic controversy. He maintained that the Anglican Church was the nation, and that consequently Nonconformists were as much interested in it as Lord Salisbury himself.
