

THE WAR.

Though there is no official de-claration yet, the telegrams seem to have fairly settled down to the conviction that Spain has accepted the terms of peace in general, and accordingly we may expect to hear of orders being given for the suspension of hostifities in a day or two. Indeed, according to one message, General Merrit has already been instructed to communicate the new situation to General Agusti and to restrain the Tagalos from further operations against Manila. There are some minor points which Spain desires to see altered, but it is not expected that these will give rise to trouble. To all intents and

purposes the war may be regarded as over The U.S. forces in Puerto Rico have occupied the town of Guaya ma, after a slight skirmish with the Spanish troops in which there were a few wounded on either side. After having evacuated the place. the Spanish troops attempted an assault but speedily relired be-tore the fire of the Zalinski gun. The inhabitants gave the U.S. forces an exceptionally enthusiastic welcome. The port of Fajardo, on the west of the island, and the surrounding district have also been occupied. The main body of the U. S. forces, under General Miles, are now in front of Juan Diaz It is again reported that the Governor of San Juan has received instructions from his Government to surrender on the same terms as General Toral.
