To realise this, it is only necessary to institute a omparison between the situation twelve months ago and the situa-

tion now. This time last year the country try was suffering under a Govern-mentto which it would no exaggeration to attribute every possible vice except that of cruelty, and even that was not entirely wanting. Though pretending to respect the outward forms of the Constitution, it was utterly unconstitutional in essence and composition. The suf-frage had been violated in the most flagrant manner; the Chambers were filled with men for the most past as utterly wanting in po-litical morality and authority as they were in representative character and who merely brought the Legislative Power into hatred and contempt; the voice of the people was merely listened to in order to be immediately defied and outraged; the Government itself gave an
example of corruption almost
beyond belief; and nearly every institution had been debauched and
degraded to serve the purposes. degraded to serve the purposes of a greedy and dishonest oligarchy. It was the «crisis of corruption» its fullest development, this was not an accidental this was not an accidental and sudden outcome, it was the steady and logical growth of a system which had prevailed in the Republic since the military mutiny of 1875, and which had been carried on and extended by one President alter another until it reach additionally applied to the collingation under Idiate. ed its culmination under Idiarte Borda. The Government was hated, mistrusted and despised by the entire people, abroad it had brought the Republic into deep dis

ruption, greed and extravagance had brought about so serious a financial crisis that it was on the very verge of bankruptcy. When the morning dawned on the 25th of August, 1897, peace, prosperity and wholesome reaction each seemed equally distant and the outlook was one of uniform gloom it was in the middle of such a situation as this that the Government insisted on holding elaborate official fêtes, and it was really small wonder that from so heavily charged an atmosphere there came the flash which aid low the man who was the central figure of the situation, if not actually the originator and princi-pal offender. Such was the situation then, and the change that has taken place is little short of mira-

culous. In fact, to describe the present situation we may reverse almost every line written above. Corruption, disorder and unpopularity have been abolished; economy, honesty and order prevail in the Government and in all administrative offices to an extent previously unknown in this Republic, the Government is hon ored, respected and trusted; the have been ignominiously turn-ed out as they deserved and their place taken by a body of honorable intelligent and patriotic men, re-presentative of all interests and all shades of political opinion, and in-spired with a desire to assist in the work of reaction; the voice of the people is listened to and respected and they can feel that they now really have that share in the go-vernment of the country which is accorded them by the Constitution; the electoral laws have been reformed and the exercise of the sulfrage restored, so that the pubhe powers will shortly be reconsstituted on a popular and unim-prachable basis. And lastly, al-though the financial clouds have by no means entirely disappeared, the credit of the Government and therefore of the Republic is restored, the revenue is rapidly recover-ing to a normal level, and the outlook is entirely hopeful. We do not say that the Govern-ment is absolutely faultless or that there are no flaws in the situation. but we do say that the improve-ment has been most wonderful and enormous, and such as not the most sanguine would have dared to dream of twelve montus

Moreover, it is diffi-cult to reconcile this step with the promise made (or believed to have been made) by Sr. Cuestas that no military proceedings should be taken against the ringleaders of the revolt—though, certainly, he has the excuse that he is merely executing the decision of the Council of State which was not bound by any such promise.

We cannot help thinking that the affair has been bungled through too great a respect for formalities, and that it would have been better for the Council to have authorised the Executive to proceed summarily, as the excep-tional circumstances demanded and the situation warranted It is rather absurd that the Executive should not be able to take decisive measures against military officers in open rebellion without reference to Tribunals some of the members of which are themselves tainted and which can only act slowly and in the presence of the guilty parties. It is not as if there were any doubt about the guilt. It seems to us evident that in this case the law and the code do not afford sufficient protection to the Executive, but are rather framed for the benefit of rebels and mutineers

### THE REVOLUTION IN URUGUAY.

pect that Sr. Cuestas should have been permitted to carry out his policy of financial purgation and reform generally in the Uruguay Republic without an effort on the part of the revolutionary elements to overthrow and remove the impersonation of a règime so decidedly objectionable to those who have been accustomed to exploit the resources of this Republic in the interests and for the benefit of private account. Hap-pily for Uruguay, the Fates have been more propitious than to sub-mit the destinies of the country to so lamentable an experience. The forces of order were found to be equal to resisting and defeating this dangerous attack upon the supreme interests of the people, who have wisely supported a man who has made himself enemies for no other reason than that he has been bold enough to confront and defy mili-tary despotism, which for so many years has been draining the life-blood of the nation; to proclaim the abolition of sinecure appointments; to put an end to the corrupt dis-tribution of fat contracts; to open up the business of the State to healthy and honest competition; exact a regular and exact record of public disbursements for purposes openly avowed; and, in a word, to conduct the alfairs of the nation on lines of probity and rigorous responsibility on the part of all its servants in all departments. We do not wonder that such a ruler should have become intolerable to the creatures of prey, hitherto permitted to devour the substance of the Uruguayan nation, but we are glad to be able to state that the patriotic sentiment of the Republic has preserved it from a menaced disaster, inasmuch as the revolution-we trust it is the last kick of Herreraism-has been effectually suppressed.

TUESDAY, JULY 26.

A bulletin signed by the four doctors in attendance on the Prince of Wales was issued yesterday morning, stating that his Royal Highness's condition, both locally as regarded the fracture, and generally, continued to be quite satis-factory. No other bulletin was published, nor was it considered necessary for the medical men to hold a consultation last night. Should this satisfactory state of things be maintained it is most probable that the Prince will be conveyed to Cowes on Saturday next, but no final decision on this point has yet been arrived at. It is reported from Cowes that the Prince will, in case the journey takes place, stay on the Royal yacht Osborne, and that the Queen will

pay him a visit on board.

# Both Sides of the Picture.

(A SHORT STORY) HER STORY.

It was bitterly cold that spring in Florence; the keen blasts from snow-covered Monte Morello and far Senario seemed to pierce through my thin closk to my very bones as I crossed the Ponte alle Grazie on my

way to the Uffizi Gallery.

I belonged to the noble army of copyists, and though as yet I had not been successful in selling any of my pictures, I was slways hoping the tide would turn some day. It was weary work, however, struggling on alone, for now my mother was dead I had not a relation in the world. I had not a relation in the world. The last few weeks I had been teeling depressed and weak, and the many stairs at the Uffixi seemed on this particular morning to try me more than usual. I climbed them slowly, stopping frequently to take breath, and it was with a sigh of relief that I sank into my obair in the west corridor.

I was working at a copy of Botticelli's «Judith,» and uncovering my canvas, settled myself at my easel. I had been painting steadily for perhaps an hour, when the sound of some one coming briskly along the gallery broke in upon my mustices, and caused, me to do look my ings, and caused me to do look up.
This quick, decided tread was very
different to the dawdling step of the
hardened copyist. There was something about it so buoyant and hopeful, so slert and determined, that I involuntarily raised my head as it drew nearer.

The new-comer, I guessed instinctively, was an artist, but of a very different type to most of those who frequented the Gallery. Prosperity was written unmistakeably upon him, from his spotless collar to his trim, highly-polished boots, and his appearance seemed to accentuate the shabby, poverty-stricken air of the rest of us. The curly hair and tall, well-knit frame bespoke health of body, but to me his charm lay not so much in the features of the handsome face as in a peculiar bright cheeriness and strength which seem-ed to pervade every line. He was English, as one saw at a glance, and his nationality was an additional grace in my eyes; he seemed to bring with him a sweet draught of my dear native air, and a sudden distaste for foreigners and their ways fell upon me. That day my spirit-loneliness pressed more heavily on me than ever.

The Englishman's easel was just behind me, and I found be intended copying the well-known portrait of Madame Lebrun. My picture did not get on at this time as it ought to have done. Slowly, and balf-insensibly, a change was passing over me. A subtle warmth and fragrance seemed to I awoke, it was with that feeling every one is familiar with, «that something nice was going to happen that day.» Of course, nothing ever did happen; my life wenton ontward-ly in the same monotonous way, shough inwardly it was different. It seemed fuller of hope and purpose, no longer so grey and colourless. And yet the chief events in it were only be coming and going of those quick footsteps, and occasional basty glimp-ses of a cheerful, resolute face, and a tall tweed-clad figure.

Thus I drifted on day by day, not guessing whither I was tending; perfectly happy when at my work, restless and ill at ease when away. All manner of foolish dreams filled my mind, the predominant one being the idea of some day painting a wonderful picture, which all the world should talk of and admire. Silly child that I was!
