POLITICAL NOTES.

The political world is once more quieting down. The rumors of alarms have again died out—though we supposed they will be revived again before long in conformity with the plan that sets them afloat. As regards the «colorado» conciliation, we understand that the conditions which General Villar and Dr. Castellanos attempt to impose as the price of their adhesion will be rejected, and the Committee formed without them. This is as it should be, and the loss is theirs. There appears to be still some doubt as to the attitude of ex-president General Tajes, but otherwise all seems fairly smooth, or at all events as smooth as can be expected where there are so many conflicting interests and opinions to reconcile.

The Executive has promulgated the law prolonging the moratorium of the National Bank for another six months.

We learn that, the instigation of the Executive, another modification will probably be introduced in the Annual Law of Property Tax (Contribucion Inmobiliaria), suppressing the fines hitherto imposed on backward payers, and imposing instead an additional 25% on the amount of the tax due.

Official contradiction has been given to an assertion published by a contemporary to the effect that the Bank of the Republic had withdrawn all the cash reserves from its branches in the interior, leaving them only with notes. There could be no reason for such a step.

We learn from Buenos Aires that the new Uruguayan Minister there has made representations before the Argentine Government, asking it to adopt precautionary measures on the river frontier against the suspicious movements of groups collected by some of the exiles and their friends. This might have been done sooner without disadvantage.

The trial of Arredondo for the assassination of President Idiarte Borda commenced yesterday. It will probably occupy several days.

The American War Tax.

The New United States War Revenue measure took effect on the 1st instant. Adhesive stamps are used in payment of the tax and affixed to, amongst others, the documents referred to below:—

Bills of lading or receipt (other than charter party) for merchandise to foreign port, \$0.10

Bills of lading, manifest or other evidence of receipt and forwarding, for each shipment by freight or express, and each duplicate, \$0.01.

Certificate of damage, or otherwise, and all other certificates or documents issued by any port warden marine surveyor, or other person acting as such, \$0.25.

Contract for charter of any vessel, or letter or memorandum, or other writing between master, owner, or person acting as agent of any vessel, and any other person, if the registered tonnage of the vessel does not exceed 300 tons \$3.00.

If exceeding 300 and not exceeding 600 tons, \$5.00.

If exceeding 600 tons, \$10.00.

Entry of any merchandise at any Custom-house, either for consumption or warehouse, not exceeding \$100 in value, \$0.25.

Exceeding \$100 and not exceeding \$500 in value, \$0.50.

Withdrawal of any goods from Customs bonded warehouse \$0.50.

Insurance (marine, inland fire) on the amount of premium charged on each policy or order instrument of insurance, on each dollar or fractional part thereof, \$0.005.

Manifest for Custom house entry or clearance of the cargo of any vessel in the foreign trade: If the registered tonnage does not exceed 300 tons, \$1.00.

Exceeding 300 and not exceeding 600 tons, \$5.00.

Passage ticket, by any vessel from a port in the United States to a foreign port, if costing not exceeding \$30, \$1.00.

Costing more than \$30 and not more than \$60, \$3.00.

Costing more than \$60, \$5.00.

Protests each, \$0.25.

Warehouse receipts for export or import merchandise each, \$0.25

The above stamp duties on manifests, bills of lading, and passage tickets do not apply to steamers or other vessels plying between ports of the United States and ports in British North America. It is understood that the various Transatlantic lines intend to pay for the stamp on passage tickets.

Extirmination of Mosquitoes.

The following, says the *South American Journal*, will be of interest to many in South and Central America:—

The Mexican Central Railway Company is engaged in a new experiment, which, if it is all that is claimed for it, will be of incalculable value to the residents of this city. To show how earnest they are in the matter, they have created a new office, that of mosquito commissioner, and the portfolio was awarded to Captain George C. Sperry, superintendent of telegraphs for the company.

Experiments in different parts of the United States, and in New Jersey in particular, have demonstrated the fact that the extermination of the mosquito can be successfully accomplished.

An exchange, in discussing the matter, says:—

«Scientific investigation has disclosed the fact that a few grains of permanganate of potash will destroy all the embryo mosquitoes in a very large area of mosquito swamp. At 2 cents an acre all the mosquitoes can be killed off for a space of 30 days, and as the breeding time is but two months 4 cents will assure protection for the entire year. This places it within the possibility of a State, and certainly a city, to entirely rid itself of a great nuisance.»

April and May are the two months in which the mosquito breeds. They are purely local in their habits, and not migratory, as some suppose, and they seldom move more than a few hundred feet from the place of their birth. Hence to exterminate the breed in a certain locality would rid that locality of the pest for that season at least, and the method of extermination is so inexpensive that an entire community may be rid of them at a very small expense.

The insect breeds in water, and a few drops of oil or grains of permanganate will prevent the eggs from hatching, and kill the young. The mosquitoes which it is the intention of the Central Company to kill off, breed in the ditch which runs along the entire length of the company's yard, and which is very prolific in this pest.

The company has bought about 20 pounds of permanganate of potash, and will begin the work of extermination within the week, when the value of the experiment will be made known shortly.

THE LATE WAR

Contradictions continue to accumulate concerning the surrender of Manila. The Official Report of General Meritt states that the surrender took place on the 13th. (Peace was signed on the 12th.) A Madrid telegram gives it as «officially confirmed» that the surrender took place on the 12th before peace was signed, yet other telegrams from the same source represent the Spanish Government as claiming the return of Manila and protesting that the capitulation cannot be taken into account in future negotiations because it occurred after peace was signed. As regards Gen. Agustin, it is now said that he had been desigedly dismissed from the Governorship by the Spanish Government from the 5th instant, in order that he might not be in a position to surrender all the Philippine Islands. It is also said now that he went on board the «Kaiserin Augusta» by express arrangement between Admiral Dewey and the German Admiral, thus destroying all the theories of undue German interference. It seems fairly but not conclusively confirmed that relations between the U. S. forces and those of Aguinaldo are hostile, owing to the refusal to allow the latter to enter the city, but it is doubtful if there has been fighting between them. Orders have been sent to General Meritt to make the Tagalos respect the authority and occupation of the United States throughout the islands. Admiral Dewey has taken some 12,000 rifles from the Spanish troops and arsenals. It is stated that the Spanish press still occupy the outposts of the city, serving to keep the Tagalos back. General Agustin has started from Hong Kong to return to Spain. The New York papers are strongly advocating the retention of the Philippines by the United States, on the double plea that the natives are incapable of self-government, and that to abandon the islands would be to provoke a European war, the Powers falling to fighting over their possession. There is a rumor that Spain, by way of baffling the designs of the United States, has conceded coaling ports in the Philippines to Russia and Germany. (If this has been done after war was declared, it is of no avail.)

It would seem that the Spaniards, no longer able to fight the N. Americans, are satisfying their thirst for blood in another manner. It is stated that on Saturday last, at Ponce on the island of Ciales (W. Indies) the Spaniards attacked the natives, who had expressed sympathy with the United States, and massacred over 100 women and children. There is also a tale that the Spaniards have massacred 500 Malays in the interior of the Philippines. It is to be hoped these are mere inventions of the «yellow» press.

Admiral Cervera has declared his intention of not returning to Spain for the present. The naval captains Paredes and Diaz Moreu have been set at liberty, the first on account of ill health, the second because he has declared the wish to go to Spain to proclaim before the Cortes (of which he is a member) the generous treatment accorded by the N. Americans to their prisoners of war.

A Vienna telegram makes out that relations between the United States and Austria-Hungary are strained, on account of the affiliation of the latter to Spain (royal family relationship) and that is the reason European hesitates to appoint an Ambassador at Washington.

SUNDRIES.

—The great event of today, we need hardly say, will be the Amateur Performance at the Solis Theatre, when will be produced Mr. Still's operetta «Jeannette». The event is one which has awakened more interest in the English-speaking community than any performance that has been given

for some time past, and judging from the brisk demand for tickets there will be a large and representative audience. Rehearsals this week have been laborious and active. We hope to be able to chronicle a big success for all concerned.

—We think it necessary to mention that, in printing the programmes of «Jeannette», the name of Mr. Drever has been omitted from the cast, by an unfortunate and regrettable oversight. Mr. Drever plays a prominent part, that of Captain Dupont, and has one of the most striking solos in the piece, so it is only fair that the omission should be mentioned, it being now too late to rectify it in the programmes themselves.

—The marriage took place yesterday at the estancia of the Pranges Company Limited «La Concordia» of Miss M. Ricketts, daughter of the manager Mr. W. Vincent Ricketts, to Mr. Albert Ricketts, son of the late proprietor Mr. Wilcox Ricketts. Their numerous friends in this city will join in wishing them every happiness.

—The marriage of Mr. R. A. Thurburn, of the London & R. P. Bank to Miss Loveday, will be celebrated at Rosario on September 1st, at the house of Mr. H. H. Loveday, the bride's brother.

—We call attention to the announcement of the finals for the President's Cup, and other golf competitions, including one for boys and girls, all of which will be played on the links on Thursday next (holiday). Entries for all the events close to-morrow.

—Officers' private letters from foreign stations, says a London exchange, contain endless complaints of the inconvenience caused by the burning of inferior coal in ships of war. Two of the chief annoyances are the soiling and spoiling of uniforms, especially on tropical stations. Moreover, the inferior coal gives a dense black smoke, which enables the ships to be sighted a longer distance off than could possibly be the case when the Welsh coal is used.

—«Waiter, bring me a couple of soft-boiled eggs»—«Voice at the next table: «The same for me, but, waiter, be sure they are fresh.»—«All right»—«Waiter's voice in the distance: «Four soft-boiled eggs. Two must be fresh.»

—The following paragraph appears in the Montevideo telegram of the *B. A. Standard* of Thursday:—«Editor Denstone of the *Montevideo Times*, has been fined \$1000 gold by Judge Rovira, for having called a spade a spade in articles that had appeared in the *Times* fifteen months ago referring to the murder in cold blood, from all accounts, of Mr. Lewis, station-master of the Central Railway, by Carmelo J. Carvalho. The iniquitous sentence of Dr. Rovira will, of course, be appealed against by Editor Denstone, and, for the credit of the Bench of the country, it is to be hoped that a higher order of Justice will prevail in the Superior Court, and that the absurd sentence will be reserved with a reprimand and costs.»

—The last number of the *Review of the River Plate* concludes an article dealing with the editor's personal experiences of the vagaries of Argentine law, with the following remark: «This is the story, which is not without a certain interest for those who endeavour to work honestly in this great, but as yet, utterly disorganised country, and the moral to be deduced from it plainly is that there is infinitely more danger in denouncing a crime in Argentina than in committing it.»—After our own experience in the Carvalho case we might imitate the above saying, that in Uruguay it is very much more dangerous to protest against an act of violence than to perpetrate it. The law acquits those who kill, but chastises those who protest and who clamour for greater protection for human life.

—It is expected that the public performances of «The Magistrate» by the members of the Buenos Aires Dramatic Club will be given about the beginning of next month, and the «The Yeoman of the Guard» will most probably be given early in October, and these two events will, we believe, close the season in Buenos Aires so far as the British community is concerned.

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—We learn from a London paper that it has been decided that in future the limits of age for the entry of assistant clerks in the Royal Navy will be 17 to 18 years of age, instead of 16 to 18 as heretofore. No candidate will be eligible for examination in November who is under 17 or over 18 years of age on the 15th January following. This regulation will come into force in 1899. A new scheme of subjects of examination has been decided upon, and can now be obtained.

—Yesterday's *Bien* has a vigorous article, which we entirely applaud, in favor of the better observance of Sunday as a day of rest from labour, both on religious grounds and on social and economical grounds. The article is specially provoked by the action of the afternoon papers, which, following the example set by the *Siglo* since the beginning of the present month, have taken to publishing Sunday editions. The staff and compositors are thus compelled to work seven days a week, to their justified dissatisfaction, which will probably end in a strike. For our part, we consider that there is a great deal too much of quite unnecessary Sunday labour in this city, and we would gladly see legislative steps taken to prohibit it, and to secure to all classes of persons that which every man has a right to, one day's rest in seven. As to the Sunday papers, there is not the least necessity for their existence here. (We believe the *Tribuna* has already declared its intention of suspending the Sunday edition.)

—The P. S. N. Co's «Oravia», bringing London dates to about July 29, is expected on Monday morning, and will sail the same day for the West Coast.

—At the Solis Theatre this evening the programme will consist of «El Duño de la Africana» (a most amusing piece), «Los Cocineros», «Mágin el Zapatero» (said to be a novelty of importance) and «El Tolledano.»

—The last three performances of the Circus Company at the Cibils Theatre are announced. There will be an afternoon function tomorrow.

—Cabinet crises are in progress in Portugal and in Austria-Hungary.

—The severe heat in the British Isles has given place to violent storms.

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—Professor Sanarelli, Director of the Institute of Experimental Hygiene, and discoverer of the yellow fever bacillus, will be back from Europe in November.

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—A nice little story is reported from Elgersburg, a bathing place in Thuringia. The other day, three wandering musicians appeared there with their fiddles on their backs, and when the table d'hôte at the Hur Hotel was over began to play a trio on the terrace. After every piece one of them went round with a plate in his hand collecting money. All at once the manager and head physician of a medical establishment there recognised in one of the shabby looking fellows a former comrade who had served with him in the same regiment thirty years ago. Astonished and pained, he approached him full of sympathy. But soon he burst into laughter. The three men turned out to be a high Berlin police official, a sculptor and a doctor, who had conceived the original idea of travelling as Bohemian musicians through all the Thuringian bathing places, to earn money for a Brahms monument to be erected in Berlin. They slept for twopenny per night at places of very doubtful character, and had many amusing adventures. At Plauen they were stopped by the police, who had been informed from Khlöthen that a theft had taken place, and that the three who had spent the night there were suspected as the malefactors. The Berlin police official had thus an opportunity to enrich his professional experience.

—Wheat still firmer, owing to the small supply, 1100 bags sold at \$4.50 superior from S. José with bag, \$4.35 and 4.40 good without. Maize slightly weaker. Quotations are \$1.10 to 1.15 without bag for distillery, and for consumption very dry \$1.20 to 1.30 with bag.

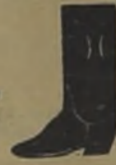
