POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Monday, some further progress was made with the discussion in detail of the Budget There was nothing of special interest in the debate.

About the only item of news of any importance, is the suspension of Col. C. Robido and Lieut. Col. A. Buzon from their posts as 1st and 2nd Chief respectively of the National Arsenal. This was effected on Monday by the Chief of the Staff in person, and Sergt. Ma jor L. Buquet, who only recently resigned the post of 2nd Chief on account of differences with his superior, was temporarily placed in charge of the establishment As we understand the step is no due to any political motives, but to alleged irregularities committee by the Chiefs in question and reported by their subordinate officers. and which will form the subject of

an official enquiry.
Yesterday's Siglo discusses at some length the financial part of the Port scheme, which still awaits the approval of the Committee of the Council of State. The view it takes is not very reassuring. In the pre sent situation a toreign loan, even for such a purpose, is almost out of the question, and in any case could only be obtained on most onerous terms. Moreover, in the case of a loan, the Government would probably be tempted to make the service a direct charge on the port, and thus by exacting heavy navigation lees, neutralise the benefits arising from the port. The Stale, however. the port. The Siglo, however, sees the way to raising a mil lion a year towards the cost of the port works, namely by raising the additional import duty \$600,000 to \$650,000 per year, and by an additional export duty of 1%, which might be depended upon for the rest. With this basis to work upon, part being applied direct to the works, and part to the service of a local loan, the Siglo thinks the difficulty might lairly be met. The cost of the port is cal culated at 15 to 15 1/2 mil culated at 15 to 15 1/2 million dollars, spread over a period of eight years, but, payments being made by completed sections, the money would only be required in instalments, and when the first half of the port was completed it would already serve as a source of income which would be applied towards the building of the second half. We may add on our own account, that the prospect of the new taxes, for a period of fifteen years or longer, is not of fifteen years or longer, is not very alluring. The development of commerce is already crippled y excessive taxation, and relief from this is hardly less necessary than the building of a port. Even the best of ports will not attract commerce where the taxation is so heavy as not to leave fair margin for profit and expansion. We cannot help thinking that at least some of the money required might be raised by less obnoxious means. There is still room for considerable etrenchment in the military budget. and given the present uncertain temper of the military it certainly could not be pretended that the dis-

honest and well intentioned Gov-ernment the National Guard would form a greater degree of security and stability than any number of regiments under command of am-bitious and imprincipled officers. The Razon of yesterday morning

Considerable discussion has been provoked by the publication in the Razon a few days ego, of the lengthy detence prepared by Dr J. M. Castellanos, of Col. Escobar, who, as our readers will remember, is unur readers will remember, is under trial on charge of sedition for having published an ardent adhesion to the subversive let-ters of Dr. A. F. Costa. In this delence Dr. Castellanos attempts to justify the attitude of his client by an appeal to the irregularity of the situation, a justification which is peculiar as coming from one who was apartisan of the coup d etatand accepted a seat -though he resigned it later-in the Council of State. The conclusions are, either that Dr. Castellanos has been led away by his desire to defend his client, or else, for reasons best known to himself, be has become a pervert to «collectivism» As only recently he refused to enter into the «colorado conciliation,» the latter explanation is not improbable. Col Bernabé Herrera, writing in the Razon of yesterday, analises Dr. Castellanos' defence at length, concluding as follows; - . The con viction which I have on these points, and above all my belief

that the theories of Dr. Ca tellanos relax army discipline, have impell ed me to combat a defence which I regard as contrary to sound military doctrine, and which give an opening to barrack mutinies, like those of 1875 and of July last, causing the people to see in the army a permanent threat, and pre-venting the Chiel Magistrate of the Republic from contiding in the guardians of public order, placing a powerful weapon in the hands of those who publicly threaten the Republic with an unjustifiable and fratricidal war that would plunge us into chaos and complete our ruin.» The Telegrafo also reproduces the substance of an interview with Sr. Cuestas in which the latter strongly condemns some of the arguments employed by Dr. Castellanos. The defence of Dr. Castellanos, t seems to us, is an example of the line frequently employed by advocates here, and of which we saw a notable example in Dr. Pa lomeque's letters on the Carvalho case and in Dr. Melian Lafinur's defence of Arredondo-that is to say that the advocate, instead of confining himself to endeavouring to prove that the deed had not been committed or was not within the scope the law, admits the deed and then, whether it be murder or sedition, endeavours to justify it by sentimental and sophistical arguments. In a word, they try to just-ily and palliate the crime, instead of merely defending the criminal.

NEW YORK NATION. There is one particular in which the most intolerant and vociferous patriots admit that our country deserves criticism. They openly confess, with more or less affectation of humility, that we have done wrong in following a policy of isolation, or at least that we shall do wrong if we continue to follow it. This discovery of our national shortcoming has had a particularly marked influence on a number of our religious editors. After great searchings of heart they now profess conviction of sin. They confess that this people has been following too much its own devices and desires, and neglecting its responsibilities fess, with more or less affectation temper of the military it certainly could not be presented that the disbanding of two or three of the regiments would be conducive to insecurity, but rather the contrary As was pointed out by Dr. Gil in the Council recently, given a popular,

and what part we are to take in it, our prophets will not disclose. They put us off with reference to the good pleasure of the Almighty; or with warnings not insincere, perhaps—about not being wise overmuch. In this there is some excuse for them, but there is no excuse for any uncertainty as to what is meant by the isolation of our country. That is not some-thing in the future, but relates to the past and the present; and if we have been guilty as a nation, we have a right to demand that our offence be clearly stated and properly proved, Since no definite answers to these inquiries are vouchsafed to the public, we will answer them ourselves.

We have isolated ourselves. We have passed laws intended to keep other nations from prospering by preventing their from selling goods to us, while we were trying to sell goods to them. We have intention-ally ruined foreign industries and brought foreign workmen to starvation, and have exulted in it. We have levied high duties on books and works of art, and have thus done what we could to exclude the highest civilisation and isolate our-selves from the most advanced development. We have built a Chinwall of tariffs against our neighbours on the north and against our neighbours on the south We have tried to hurt the poor fishermen of New-foundland and the poor min-ers of Mexico, and have en-deavoured to make the planters of Cuba and the rauchmen of Argentina pay our taxes. We have done these things from avowedly selfish motives, and on the ground that we were looking out for our own interests, and not for those of other nations, and we have boasted of our success. Of such a policy of isolation we may plead guilty, and, for our own part, we need hardly say that we have denounced this policy in season and out of season, and been denounced in return as «un American» for doing so.

But in equally important respects we have not isolated ourselves We have bossted, and we did well in boasting, that this country was the refuge for the oppressed of all na-tions. We have welcomed the poor people of Europe to our shores and our homes. We have invited them to a land where they should be free in their religion and in their lives, in their thoughts and in their acts. We have provided them with the blessed privileges of education for their children and of homes for their families. We have welcomed them to a happy land, where the right to labour and to accumulate and enjoy the fruits of labour was a fundamental principle of the Constitution and was carefully recognised by our laws, as it was no-where else in the world; a land where taxation was not burdensome, and where they could enjoy exemption from the perennial curse of older countries, the crushing weight of military armaments. We have accepted them as fellow-citizens on the ground of the equality of all men, as the children of a common Father, and shared with them that sashared with them that sa-cred right of self government pro-claimed in our Declaration of Independence and our Bills of Rights. We have sometimes faltered in our course and wavered in our policy; but we have on the whole exhibited to the world the most splendid example of non-isolation that the world has ever seen or can ever again see. And now we are asked to abandon our generous principles of hum-an equality and self government, of peace and freedom, and engage in military struggles. Our imperialists do not tack of war, but they mean it. They tell us that other nations will spring at our throats if we are not on our guard; they pray that we may be quick to resent insults, and in-sist on steps that will convert the friendly feeling of other nations into hatred and hostility. Henceforth no American can expect to be a welcome traveller in Spain, perhaps soon not a welcome visitor in France or Germany.

Argentine-Chilian limits is again at boiling point, the experts at Santiago being japparently agreed to disagree. Yesterday's papers contained some two columns of tedious matter over the point, but we certainly do not intend to inflict the details of the wretched squabble on our readers. Chili's territory is limited so she has some excuse for holding out, but Argentina, which already has a territory equal to about half the area of rope, has certainly no occasion to quarrel over a lew leagues more or less of barren and useless land on the tops of the Andes.

-It would be a good thing if all the maps, and all the reports, and all the documents in the Argentine Chilian boundary squabble were locked up in a sale for fifty years, and the newspapers on both sides of the Andes forbidden to refer to it or to discuss it under severe penalties. By that time, the people might learn that South American countries have something more important to do than to quarrel with each other over questions of limits, and that it was better to be friends than enemies. Argentina could easily give all the disputed land to Chile and never feel the loss, and it would be worth her while to do so for the sake of peace and friendship.

-The Podesta Company will commence a short season of criollo dramas at the San Felipe Theatre on Saturday next.

There has been a terrible fire at the city of New Westminster, capital and port of the province of that name, on the Fraser river, in British Columbia. 328 houses, stores and shops in the port district of the city have been destroyed, leaving some 10,-000 people homeless. There was considerable loss of life, and the material damages reach several million dollars.

-An Englishman who reserves his name has offered £50,000 to endow a college at Khartoum in memory of General Gordon.

—In the military manœuvres now going on in France, conclus-ive proof has been made of the folding bicycle, in virtue of which it has been decided to form other corps of the cyclists.

-Sir Martin Gosselin, who re-places Mr. Curzon as Foreign Under Secretary of State, is a wellknown amateur of music, and in his younger days, when he was a fellow student at Eton with Sir Charles Parry, now Director of the Royal College of Music, he was much esteemed as a pianist.

—A curious story comes from Rushdeo, the moral of which is plain. When the memorial stones of the Independent Wesleyan (Wesleyan Reform Union) Chapel, High-street, Rushden, were laid in 1873, some official documents, current newspapers, and coin minted that year were sealed in a bottle and placed in a crevice prepared for that purpose in one of the stones. —In all the records of strange marriages none, can possibly ex-

marriages none can possibly explace in St Louis. The bride and bridegroom were originally man and wife who had been divorced. This in itself would not make the case unique, for such marriages have been known to occur before, but the bridegroom had been married four times and yet has only had two wives, for wife number two was married after wife number one was divorced, wife number one remarried as wife number three, and his wife number two married again after number three had divorced him.

-It is telegraphed from Buenos Aires that the police have discovered a band of incendiaries with branches throughout the Republic, who are believed to be responsible for the fires that have been so numerous there of late. It is added that several merchants (1) have been arrested in connection with the matter.

-The Extraordinary Tribunal has just issued final sentence in the oldest law-suit in the Republic, namely one that was menced seventy years ago, that is to say in the year 1828, respecting the succeesion to certain lands in Colonia. The Tribunal has confirmed the sentence of the previous court, rejecting an appeal of enulidad extraordinarias which was lodged ten years ago. Not one of the litigants, advocates or Judges concerned in the origin of this case is now surviving.

The Dreyfus question is still agitating the French Cabinet, which, contrary to what was reported some days ago, has not yet decided on a revision. It is said that in case General Zurlinden resigns the portfolio of War, it will be temporarily taken by the Premier Mr. Brisson. taken by the Premier Mr. Brisson, who is in favor of revision. Another report is to the effect that President Faure is strongly opposed to revision and even threatens to resign if it is decided upon.

-The body of the unfortunate Empress of Austria is now on the way from Geneva to Vien-na, for burial. The Emperor has refused to allow any photographs of the body to be taken, as the Empress was always adverse to being photographed during her life. (The only pictures extant of her represent her as still young.) She is said to have preserved beauty in death. The police have found the weapon with which the assassination was committed. This was a common triangular file, which the assassin had fixed in a rough wooden handle and pointed sharply. The wound it made was a ly and touched the lower lobe of the heart. (It is extraordinary that the Empress should have been able to walk the steamer after being thus wounded.) The tele-grams are full of the antecedents of the assassin Luccheni, but these throw but little light on the crime, beyond confirming that he had no accomplices. Outside his anarchist associations his previous conduct seems to have been good, and no other crimes stand on record against him.

-The assassination of the Empress of Austria has created the customary panic against anarchists in Europe, and the papers are making the wildest suggestions as to how to deal with them. The Swiss authorities have resolved to be more stringent as to the admission of anarchist refugees into Swiss ter-ritory, and have begun by ar-resting several stray anarchists, who, however, bave no connection with the present crime. The worst effect, however, has been to enrage the Austrians in Austro-Italy against the Italians, and several outrages from this cause are already reported. In several of the Austrian factories, also, attacks have been made upon the Italian workmen.

-Twenty persons have been killed or injured and three houses destroyed by an explosion in a de-posit of inflammables in a suburb of Philadelphia, U.S.

-Affairs in Crete continue to be most uneasy, but without fresh de-velopment of importance. Two Brit-ish soldiers, who had wandered from the main body, have been murdered by Mussulmans. Gener-al Sir Herbert Chernside has left

A telegram was received in New York yesterday reporting the fall of Manila. A steamer has arrived at Hong Kong having on board General Augusti, the Spanish Gov-ernor General of the Phillippines. Speculation is rife as to the manner of his escape. At the same time it is reported from Madrid that both General Augusti and Marshal Blanco have resigned.

In Dublin, yesterday, a great Nationalist demonstration took place in memory of Wolfe Tone, a leader of the movement of 1798. It was attended by the Lord May-or, the High Sheriff of the City, delegates frhm all parts of the country, and from many Continen-tal cities, besides a special delega-tion from Maine and Massachusetts. The foundation stone of a memorial to Wolfe Tone was laid at St. Stephen's Green, and ad dresses were delivered by Mr. John Dillon and Mr. John Redmond

An appeal to masters and men engaged in the South Wales coal dispute has been issued by the Ministers of Cardiff, in which they testify to the great misery brought about by it, and urge all concerned, in the name of God and of humanity, to unite in the endeavour to bring about a speedy settlement.

A two days regatta, organized by the Royal Albert Yacht Club, was opened yesterday at Southsea, the interest in the different competitions being somewhat marred by the slight wind and the haze which obscured the Channel. Aurora, Allsa, and Bona were the candidates for the Albert Cup, which was carried off by the latter vessel, Among the other events was one for yachts above 59 tons, Thames measurement, and in this Latona beat Creola and Hysigist. beat Creole and Hyacinth.

In two instances yesterday some extremely heavy scoring took place in the cricket matches. At the Oval, Surrey having first chance on an excellent pitch, made such splendid use of their opportunities that they remained in during the whole time play was in progress and put together a total of 368 for the loss of only two batsmen. Far and above everything else was the brilliant batting of Abel, who went in first and at the close had not been got rid of, having in the meantime made 202-only the second score of over 200 obtained this season. Playing against Derbyshire at Leicester, the Leicestershire Eleven were also seen to advantage, keeping their opponents in the field all day while they made 325 for the loss of nine wickets. At Cheltenham, Gloucestershire scored 260, and then got two Essex wickets down for 33. At Brighton, Sussex, after making 220, dismissed three Lanceshire batsmen for 19; and at Leeds Yorkshire, on a soft wicket, made 142, and Middlesex 108 for five wickets.

Extraordinary beat was again experienced in London yesterday and lead to a considerable number of persons being incapacited by sheat strokes while either engaged at work or walking in the public thoroughfares. Many of these cases were dealt with at the hospitals; while inquiries held by Coroners during the day showed that more than one death was attributable to the high temperature.

A dif-ferent news agency to that which supplied us with the foregoing report states that in an interview with the deceased's son-in-law the latter said his relative had not been murdered, but had died of heart disease; and, further, that no attempt had been made to enter the house. to enter the house.

Evidence was given at an inquest held yesterday by Mr. E.N. Wood, to the effect that a carman named James Fisher had died from a frac-tured skull and broken ribs, receiv-ed in a van accident. It was also shown that the deceased was sent from Guy's Hospital without the ex-tent of his injuries being discovered, and that he was subsequently de-tained at the police station on a charge of drunkenness. The jury found a verdict of Accidental death, but added that in their opinion the house surgeon at Guy's had com-mitted a serious error of judgment. The Coroner endorsed their view, and said he could not exonerate the police in the matter.


