POLITICAL NOTES.
Matters generally were much calmer yesterday. The excitement over the suspension of the Treasury Certificates has cooled down, and the market, accepting the inevitable, is once more showing a firmer tone. The text of the Message respecting the consolidation of the outstanding Certificates has not yet been published. According to the *Siglo* the bonus proposed is 20% for the Certificates of November, 1897, 18% for those of December, 16% for those of January, and so on successively until it comes to 4% for those of July. The *Siglo* adds, however, that an effort will be made in the Council of State to increase this bonus. It is further stated that the State pensioners will present a petition to the Council against the proposed tax of 5% being applied to their pensions, alleging that they are already severely taxed. This may be true enough, but they should also remember how illegitimate and abusive the large majority of their pensions are.

Our contemporaries still have a great deal to say about the oft-threatened «collectivist» invasion, and produce the usual batch of alarmist telegrams fabricated in Buenos Aires. One of these pretends that an army of 5000 men, well equipped with horses, rifles and even artillery, is ready at Gualaguaychu, and will shortly invade the country with the redoubtable Julio Herrera at their head. Official telegrams from the frontier towns report everything perfectly tranquil.

It now transpires that the conspiring officers Burgos and Isamendi were not interned by the Brazilian authorities, as was asserted some ten days ago, but after a few days' arrest were allowed to return to Buenos Aires, where they now form part of the circle of perpetual conspirators gathered round Dr. Julio Herrera. It is also denied that any application has been made or will be made to the Argentine Government for the internation of Dr. Herrera. To us, it seems perfectly scandalous that the Argentine authorities should allow open conspiracy against a friendly neighbour to be carried on within their capital and in the most public manner, but here it seems to be accepted as a matter of course, and it is even pretended that there is no treaty between the two countries that permits of a protest being made! These are things beyond rational explanation, and certainly do not betoken a high grade of civilisation.

On Tuesday the Port scheme was again under consideration by the united Committees of the Council of State, the Minister of Foment attending. It was resolved that the additional Customs Duty might be applied to the Port works from March 1st next, it being believed that by that time, and with the return to constitutional forms, the general revenue would have sufficiently improved to admit of this. Other parts of the financial scheme were discussed, but without any resolutions being adopted, and the matter was left over for another meeting to be held to-day.

Puerto Rico.

Puerto Rico, which is about to pass from Spain after four hundred years of uninterrupted possession, has been described by a French writer as the «most smiling and luxuriant gem of the Antilles.» When it comes into American hands Puerto Rico is expected to become a favourite winter resort and refuge for invalids. The climate is healthy, and the weather in the mountain valleys from November to April is said to be delightful. The north wind blows steadily, and the island is very pleasant to live in. Wooded ravines descend from the mountains, through which streams of sparkling water run to the sea. Between these ravines lie wide stretches of meadow land, the home of herds of wild cattle. The soil of Puerto Rico is of great fertility. There is also an abundant supply of water. Even in the southern portion of the island where the rains are less, water can always be found by digging one or two feet beneath the ground. The mills and valleys are luxuriant with verdure; the mountains are green to their tops, and cultivable at any height.

Puerto Rico has had an eventful history. Discovered in 1493 by Columbus it remained in the undisputed possession of Spain for a hundred years. In the next two centuries no fewer than six attempts were made by England and Holland to capture the island. All however, failed. Drake, in 1595, rudely disturbed the Spanish colonists by forcing his way into the port of San Juan, burning a part of the town and destroying several Spanish ships. In 1697 the Earl of Cumberland again attacked San Juan. He captured the citadel, but an epidemic among his troops forced him to abandon the place. In 1625 the Dutch, under General Heinrich seized San Juan and laid siege to Morro Castle. The Spaniards, in a desperate sortie, defeated the Dutch and killed their General. In 1678 an English attack was foiled by a severe storm, which dispersed the fleet and damaged many ships. In 1703 another attempt was made. A landing at Arecibo, thirty miles west of San Juan, was effected, but the English force was repulsed with loss and forced to re-embark. In 1797 Sir Ralph Abercromby led an army of 10 000 men against the capital. This force was found to be inadequate, and Abercromby retired after a siege of less than a fortnight. Since that day till May 12 of this year, when the American fleets bombarded the forts of San Juan, Spain has not been disturbed in her possession of this fertile island.

Football.

Albion 2nd XI versus German Football Club.—This match was played at Punta Carretas on Sunday last, in rather disagreeable weather, before some 500 spectators. The Albion 2nd XI, with only 10 men, won by 4 goals to 1 (this team has only lost one match out of the 12 played.) Williams, who was playing remarkably well, scored 2 goals in the first half, and Lodge and Thomas scored in the 2nd half. The Germans worked hard, but the only goal credited them resulted from the strong wind blowing back the ball into the net, after it had been smartly saved by Ramsay. For the winners, Thomas, Williams, Ramsay, Ferrás and C. Swindan deserve mention. For the losers, Caradas, Carve, the brothers Strauch and Hoppe in goal, were the most conspicuous.

The last match of the season will be played next Sunday, at Punta Carretas, between the Albion F. C. and the C. U. R. C.

SUNDRIES.

The difficulties about the San Felipe Theatre have been got over, so that after all it will be possible to repeat the performance of Mr. Still's operetta «Jeanette», which was so successful on its first production, on Wednesday next, as originally announced. In order to increase the attraction, the rest of the programme has been completely changed and will consist of the comedieta «Two Riats and a Sharp», represented by Mrs. Towers, Mrs. Lynn and Mr. P. C. Towers and Tennyson's stirring poem «The Defence of Lucknow» recited by Mr. W. H. Denstone. The prices for tickets have been considerably reduced. The arrangements for the sale of tickets will be found in the corresponding advertisement.

The R. M. S. «Danube» bringing London dates to about August 20 is expected tomorrow morning.

The performances of the Opera Company at the Solis Theatre will be resumed this evening with «Traviata», the Sr. Te trazzini taking the principal part, which is one that suits her admirably. The other principal singers are Sr. Maini and Sr. Athos.

Judge Montañó has passed sentence of 11 years' imprisonment on Juan Carvalho, for the murder of Alejandro Rodriguez, committed at Rivera in April, 1897. We are already in trouble with one Carvalho over a case of murder, and we hope that this other Carvalho will not prosecute us for personal injuries and claim \$2000 damages if we venture to suggest that 11 years' imprisonment is a very inadequate punishment for a brutal murder committed with aggravating circumstances, as set forth in the verdict in this case. It is not by such insufficient sentences as this that the country will be purged of the stain of blood.

The resident Brazilians were *en fêta* yesterday, it being the anniversary of Brazilian independence.

The formal coronation of Queen Wilhelmina of Holland took place in the Cathedral at Amsterdam on Tuesday, with great ceremony, and amidst enthusiastic public rejoicings. The young Queen showed remarkable self-possession throughout the trying scene.

The complete recovery is now announced of the Argentine ex-president Dr. Pellegrini, who had been seriously ill in Paris.

We regret to learn that General L. E. Pérez has had a relapse and is again seriously ill.

Italy and Austria have made favorable replies to the Czar's proposals for an international convention to discuss the question of general disarmament, and so has Denmark among the smaller States. We do not know that any others have yet made a formal reply.

The appeal against our condemnation by the Correctional Judge in the Carvalho prosecution goes before the Judge of Crime Dr. Bastos. We are glad of this, as we know Dr. Bastos to be an intelligent, learned and upright functionary, whose decision we can await without misgiving. We will keep our readers informed of the progress of the appeal, but it may be some months before the matter is settled.

It is telegraphed from Washington that the large U. S. armour-clads Oregon and Iowa will leave for the Pacific in the course of a fortnight. We expect they will call here on their way.

The Dreyfus case continues to agitate France, but there is not yet any new development of importance. The new Minister of War Gen. Zurlinden is known to be favorable to a revision of the case, so we may shortly expect to hear of this being allowed. It is even hinted that he may propose the revocation of the case and the shelving of the whole matter, so as to avoid the revelations that would arise from a fresh and public trial. This, however, would be

London Notes.

Spain's reply to the peace terms offered by America yesterday afternoon.

General Shafter telegraphs to Washington from Santiago that the condition of the army there is not as bad as may be concluded from the statements published yesterday. His admissions, however, do not tend to show that the state of affairs was greatly exaggerated.

In the House of Lords yesterday the Vaccination Bill, with the Conscience Clause reinserted by the Lower Chamber, was again under discussion, and, as the result of a division, the previous majority of two against the Clause was changed

into one of ten in favour of its restoration, the figures being 45 against 55. The Nonconformist Marriage (Attendance of Registrar) Bill and the Elementary School Teacher's Superannuation Bill were each read a third time.

In the House of Commons in reply to a question from Mr. Gourlay Mr. Balfour said that until completed surveys of Wei-hai Wei had been made no statement as to its capabilities as a naval base could be made to Parliament; further that no exchange of the place was contemplated «it being exceedingly well suited to the purposes for which it was required.» Supply was then proceeded with, and at 10 o'clock the «guillotine» fell upon the remaining votes, which were taken without discussion.

Discussion took place yesterday at a meeting of the Dublin Corporation on a letter from the Duke of Westminster, Chairman of the Gladstone Memorial Committee, asking the Lord Mayor to bring before the Council the proposal to erect national memorials of the deceased statesmen in London, Dublin, and Edinburgh. The Lord Mayor was in the West of Ireland and Mr. Mulligan, a Nationalist, presided. Mr. Sherlock, a Parnellite, moved that no statue should be erected in Dublin to any Englishman until the Irish people had raised a fitting monument to Mr. Parnell. This was carried amid applause.

Communication was successfully opened yesterday between Waterloo and the City by means of the London and South Western Railway Company's new underground line. No difficulty was experienced and the trains, which are propelled by electricity, ran well and regularly.

A Dover Correspondent says that the collection of German pigeons there, numbering nearly 20,000, were started yesterday morning by two men, one of whom is said to be a German Government agent. The weather was very ill-suited to the purpose, but the men were evidently anxious to get the birds away. A considerable number of the latter went inland, and it was considered that most of them would perish in the North Sea. Prizes for these pigeon flights are given by the German Emperor and the German Minister of War, and that it is believed they have some reference to the large naval harbour now in progress at Dover.

Middlesex and Surrey commenced their return match at Lord's yesterday under very cheerless conditions, no play was possible until half past one, but subsequently Middlesex played very well, having, at the drawing of stumps, scored 241 for seven wickets. At Brighton, the weather was even more unfavourable, rain seriously interrupting the game between Sussex and Hampshire. All that was done amounted to the scoring of 131 for four wickets by Sussex, for whom C. B. Fry made 81 not out. The Cheltenham Week opened with the return contest between Gloucestershire and Kent, playing going considerably in favour of the home team, who after scoring 189 dismissed six of the Kent batsmen for 75 runs. Warwickshire and Essex met at Birmingham, the former, thanks to the brothers Quaise, completing a first innings for 187, while Essex afterwards lost one wicket for 19. Yorkshire in opposing Notts at Trent Bridge were without Jackson and Wainwright, but after a bad start ran up a score of 280 for seven wickets.

The Queen, on the recommendation of the Home Secretary, has granted a free pardon to John Dixon, who was sentenced on a charge of sheep-stealing to five years' penal servitude, at a Criminal Court in the Isle of Man, a month ago.

Judgment was given yesterday, in a specially constituted Court, composed of the Lord Chief Justice and Justices Wright and Kennedy, in the matters of the Queen v. Hole and the Queen v. Spilsbury, both of them under the Fugitive Offenders Act. The application on the part of the prisoner Hole, charged with embezzlement at the Cape, for bail was disallowed. In the second case, which relates to the proceedings of those in charge of the vessel *Tourmaline* off the coast of Morocco, the application was for a writ of habeas corpus or for bail for Major Spilsbury, who has been committed for removal to Tangier for trial. The application was refused, but the trial was directed to take place at Gibraltar.

Too Much of a Good Thing.

An exceedingly humorous incident of the present war is attracting a good deal of attention in America at the present time. A young lady desirous of collecting funds for the Red Cross Society started the ball rolling on the geometrical progression plan of getting four friends to give her ten cents, and each to write to four others to make the same contribution, and so on. Her success was greater than she anticipated, or, it would seem, than she desired. After a few days the letters began to come to her by dozens, and in a week by hundreds, the numbers increasing as the days went by till they were literally reckoned by the thousands, and the Post Office department in the town in which she lived had to be augmented by several clerks, while the letters addressed to the energetic young lady are now being delivered in crates and baskets, and her parents' house which is a large one, has been inundated, and the whole of the family and friends are turned temporarily into the damsel's secretaries, opening the envelopes and entering the sums which are sent. In many cases far more has been contributed than the original ten cents asked for, some cheques being for quite large amounts, but in other cases there have been letters the reverse of polite. Already 125,000 letters have been received, and the cry is «still they come.» The post age alone on these amounts to \$500.

up on the Judge's order to appear as respondent in a suit for divorce brought against him by his wife, an American lady. A scene took place in consequence of the woman Runcieman had married in the second place, excitedly taking his part; and counsel for the petitioner stated that when arrested the respondent was about to marry a third woman. Mr. Justice Baines granted a decree nisi with costs.
Mr. John Troutbeck, the Westminster Coroner, yesterday resumed his inquest concerning the death of Alice Rebecca Bayly, aged 26, a milliner's saleswoman, of Plumstead, for causing which, by an alleged illegal operation, Dr. John Lloyd Whitmarsh, of 116 Brompton-road, now stands committed for trial at the Central Criminal Court. At the conclusion of the evidence the jury returned a verdict of willful murder against Dr. Whitmarsh.—Dr. David Wallace, practising at Beckenham, was also committed for trial from the Bromley (Kent) Petty Sessions for performing an illegal operation on a girl named Warrilow, but was liberated on bail.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 10.

A sortie in force was made by the Spaniards from Manila late on the night of the 31st ult. They were repulsed after hard fighting in which they are stated to have lost 300 killed and 900 wounded. The insurgents remained neutral throughout.

In the House of Lords yesterday the Local Taxation (Accident) Scotland Bill was read a third time, and a number of other Bills passed their final stages.

In the House of Commons, in reply to a number of questions, Mr. Curzon said he should be unable to make any statement as to the Newchwan Railway before the prorogation of Parliament, and that the Chinese Government had expressed gratitude to the British Government for their promise of support, adding that no threat of aggression had been made. He also gave an explanation as to the alleged German opposition to the scheme for a truck railway from Tientsin to Chin Kiang, and quoted a dispatch from Herr von Billow, which stated that the German Government had made no attempt to preclude other nations from free competition in the province of Shantung. In reply to another question, Mr. Curzon said no information had been received as to the suspension of hostilities between Spain and the United States, nor was he in a position to make any statement regarding the terms of peace. Report of Supply was afterwards taken, and the Appropriation Bill was read a first time.

Lord Charles Beresford has written to the chairman of the York Conservative Association apologising to his constituents for being unable to fulfil his recess engagements as, with the consent of the Admiralty, he has been commissioned by the Associated Chambers of Commerce to proceed to China and make a report on the future prospects of British Trade and commerce with that country, and especially as to what extent the Chinese Government appear to be in a position to guarantee the safe employment of British capital.

The Lords of the Committee of the Council of Education have appointed Mr. Walter Crane to the Principalship of the Royal College of Art at South Kensington, vacant by the retirement of Mr. Sparkes.

No result has attended the offer of the Tredegar Coal and Iron Company to settle with their workmen on the basis of a minimum fixed at 10 per cent above the standard, independently of the Coal Owners' Association. The suggestion was declined by the men and the negotiations have collapsed. A movement in favour of the resumption of work, however, is going on among the general body of the workmen on the basis of a sliding scale with a minimum, and a meeting of the provisional committee is to be held this morning at Pontypriid.

Many of the pigeons sent up from Dover on Monday by supposed emissaries of the German Government were yesterday flying about the town in a more or less exhausted condition. Enquiries were made at Dover by an official from the English Foreign Office, and the coast guards are said to have been instructed to capture as many of the birds as possible. It is further alleged that London is to be the next place from which German pigeons are to be trained to fly to the Fotherland.

A large number of spectators assembled at Ryde yesterday to witness the racing under the auspices of the Royal Victoria Yacht Squadron. The Commodore's Cup was won by Bona, her competitors, Ailsa and Aurora giving up. In the second and third races Astrild and Carress, respectively, were successful.

All over England the cricket grounds were yesterday a good

deal affected by the rain on the previous day, and batsmen were consequently placed at considerable disadvantage. Under adverse conditions Surrey played up finely against Middlesex at Lord's, but their total fell 75 short of that of their opponents, and Middlesex, doing well at their second attempt, left off 114 runs ahead, with all ten wickets in hand. At Trent Bridge Yorkshire's innings was finished off for 277; but Notts, after being dismissed at their first attempt for 99, made exactly that number for the loss of one wicket. Hampshire, in their contest with Sussex at Brighton, were 90 runs behind on the first innings, and the latter county going in again scored 139 for two wickets. C. B. Fry only just missed repeating his triumphs of scoring two separate hundreds, his innings amounting to 99 and 108 not out. At Birmingham, Warwickshire, who led by 80 runs on the first innings, afterwards scored 174 for six wickets against Essex. The one match brought to a definite issue was that at Cheltenham, where, after a very exciting struggle, Gloucestershire beat Kent by 27 runs. C. L. Townsend and Martin bowling finely for their respective sides.

Sir Francis Jeans delivered judgement in the Admiralty Court yesterday, in the case in which the owners of the Cromartyshire claimed damages from the French Company owning the steamship Bourgoigne, which was recently sunk under painful circumstances. The defendants had moved to set aside the writ served upon their London agent, on the ground that they were a foreign corporation not carrying on business in this country, and that therefore the service was bad. The learned judge held that the service was good and dismissed the motion with costs, at the same time granting leave to appeal.
