SUSPENSION OF THE TREASURY CERTIFICATES.
RETURN TO CASH PAYMENTS.

The suspension of the Treasury Certificates, and the return to cash payments, has been the subject of much discussion in the public mind. The Government has been unable to meet its obligations, and the public has been forced to wait for the return of cash payments. 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and certainly cannot be regretted from other points of view; on the contrary, we think that the Government ought to be congratulated on feeling itself strong enough to return to the far more wholesome and correct system of cash payments, which, under the present administration, there is no doubt will be observed with the same punctuality as it has hitherto converted the Certificates. Indeed, the change had to come sooner or later—the system of the Certificates could not be made perpetual—so that the only real question is whether the moment for the change has been wisely chosen, and of this we think the Government may be allowed to be the best judge. As to the new debt which has to be created, and which is a legacy of the past administration rather than a creation of the present, for the moment we cannot say what provision the Government is prepared to make for it; but of this it is premature to speak until the plans of the Government are fully known, so we reserve further comment until the appearance of the corresponding Decree.

POLITICAL NOTES.
In the Council of State, on Friday, approval was given to the Bill providing for the construction of a bridge over the river Cuapirú, Department of Rivera. There was no other business of public interest.

In addition to the excitement caused in the market by the suspension of the Treasury Certificates, with which we dealt apart, the political world has been greatly agitated by rumors of more or less the usual alarmist description, and probably of the usual malicious "collectivist" origin. These rumors insist very strongly on the discovery of another military conspiracy, but, so far as is only generally known, the only basis consists in the eternal intriguer Dr. Julio Herrera (who more than ever, ever on the scaffold) having addressed insidious letters to certain military officers, endeavoring to subvert them from their loyalty to Sr. Cuestas. One of these was addressed to Col. Buquet, who immediately placed it in the hands of Sr. Cuestas. A copy of this letter was published in yesterday's *Tribuna*, and it is worthy of the mephistophelian character of its author, who, as usual, contrives to invert all notions of honor and morality. As it happens, he completely mistook his man, and Col. Buquet published a vigorous reply, affirming his loyalty to the present situation, declaring that he wished to have nothing to do with Dr. Herrera or his policy, and qualifying the latter's letter as an unmitigated piece of impertinence. We hope Dr. Herrera is satisfied. There have also been rumors of Cabinet dissensions and ministerial resignations, but these are entirely without foundation. It is certainly astonishing how these rumors, proved false again and again, still find credence each time they are floated. For our part, judging from the experience of the last six months, the greater the number of rumors, the firmer the situation, and it is only when they die out that there is real danger, as shown by the military outbreak of July 4, which came at a moment of apparently complete tranquillity. It is hardly necessary to say that conspirators who mean business do not publish their plans beforehand, and therefore, although no doubt there is a malicious object in the chronic circulation of these alarmist rumors, they should not be regarded as forerunners of action.

The Decree has been published accepting the resignation of General Salvador Tajes as Chief of the Staff, and temporarily entrusting the duties to the 2nd Chief Col. Antonio Marquez. The letters exchanged between General Tajes and President Cuestas, which have also been made public, should leave no doubt as to the genuineness of the former's plea of ill-health as a reason for his resignation, and Sr. Cuestas expresses the hope that before long General Tajes will be able to return to the post. Whether this will be kept open for him, we cannot say. There are rumors that it will be offered to General Pedro Callorda, not a very popular choice. There is not the least foundation for the rumors of the resignation of General Nicomedes Castro as Minister of War.

So far, only three of those deported in connection with the military mutiny of July 4 have availed themselves of the permission to return. These are Sr. Kuby y Arteaga, General Navajas, and Col. Etcheverry, the latter arriving on Friday.

The *Dia*, which is semi-official, assures its readers that, in case the Council of State should approve the restoration of bull fights, Sr. Cuestas will exercise his privilege of vetoing the law. Such an action would certainly correspond to the ideas of all the better and more civilized classes of the capital,

though no doubt it would bring him into some disfavor with those interested in the revival of the brutal and brutalising sport. We trust the assertion of the *Dia* may be true—though in any case it is difficult to believe that the Council will give its sanction to the amiable proposal.

THE THURBURN-LOVEDAY WEDDING.
We reproduce from the *Times of Argentina* the following account of the wedding of Mr. R. A. Thurburn, which we are sure will interest many of our readers here, where Mr. Thurburn is as well-known and as popular as the other side of the River Plate.

The eyes of the whole of the British and English speaking community in the Republic were yesterday (September 1) turned to Rosario where one of the most important events of the social season was celebrated in the presence of friends and relatives from all parts of the country; viz. the marriage of Mr. R. A. Thurburn, the popular Manager of the London and River Plate Bank in this city, with whom the Argentine people have become acquainted through the native press by his connection with the great Banquet to the President Elect of the Republic, and Miss Bertha Loveday, second daughter of Mr. H. H. Loveday, of Derby, and sister of Mr. H. H. Loveday Jr., the Manager of the Central Argentine Railway.

St. Bartholomew's Church in Rosario was crammed with friends and relatives yesterday afternoon to witness the ceremony, the edifice having been prettily decorated for the occasion. Many of the leading residents of Rosario were present, besides the scores that went from this city by the night trains on Tuesday and Wednesday last. Shortly after the appointed hour the bridal party arrived, the handsome bride appearing on the arm of her brother Mr. H. H. Loveday, and being attended by six bridesmaids, Miss Irene Shimield, the Misses Gladys and Elaine Thurburn, Miss Lady's Friend and the Misses Daisy and Ascelin Collett-Mason.

The bride was tastefully attired in a gown of white duchesse satin with full court train, adorned with true lover's knots of wide satin ribbon down the left side, ending in a cluster of white heather, myrtle and orange blossom. The tulle veil was held in place by a diamond star, and on the lace of the corsage was a superb sapphire and diamond brooch, both the gifts of the bridegroom. The bridesmaids' dresses were very pretty indeed, Miss Irene Shimield wearing a trained dress of white satin with a long eau de nil chiffon sash and hat of white drawn chiffon trimmed with white violets; her gift from the bridegroom being diamond and pearl twin heart brooches. The five little girls wore frocks of white Liberty silk with eau de nil chiffon sashes and hats of drawn white silk, and they carried shepherdesses' crooks with white nosegays. Standard* furnishes the following interesting particulars of Mr. Miller of Nueva Palmira, whose death we noted recently:—Alexander Ambrose Miller, (who died on 24th ult at his Estancia in Nueva Palmira) was the eldest son of Mr. John Miller, merchant of Elgin, North Britain, who came to B. Aires in the year 1810; and shortly afterwards, married Miss

Dolores Balbastro (whom Robertson in his "English in South America," speaks of at the time as one of the reigning beauties of B. Aires). He had by her a large family of which four of the daughters still survive and live in England, the youngest being Doña Margarita Parish. Mr. Miller's firm subsequently merged into Miller Eyes and Co., finally lapsing into that of James O. Thompson and Co. He died in the forties, leaving two estancias: "Los Toldos," and "Nueva Caledonia" in Cañuelas, both afterwards sold by his family. Alexander managed "Los Toldos," until it was disposed of; and in 1859 bought the Estancia at Higuerales, where he resided until the end of his days, which as I said before, terminated on the 24th August, and in his 78th year.

—This will be the last night of the short (and not very brilliant) opera season at the Solis Theatre. "Faust," which has perhaps been the most successful performance of the Company, will be repeated, with the same cast as before.

—Four persons have been killed and 20 seriously injured in a railway collision, on Friday, at Willingborough (near Northampton, England.)

—It is now considered doubtful whether Professor Sanarelli will return to Montevideo, as the Italian Government is anxious to secure his services in his own country, now that he has become a scientific celebrity.

—The *Tribuna*—the great champion of bull fighting—keeps up its campaign against the Waterworks Company, making a daily attack. The latest fear of the *Tribuna* is that the Company will suspend its service and leave the city without water. If the water is so bad and so dear as the *Tribuna* pretends, this could hardly be a loss. For our part, we think the Company would do no harm to suspend the service for a few days, just to let its assailants and detractors see where the city would be without it. The *Tribuna* seems equally disposed to bully the Company either for supplying water or for not supplying it.

—The latest and most terrible hint over the Dreyfus scandal in France, is that Col. Henry did not commit suicide, but was murdered to prevent him making more revelations! The French Cabinet does not seem to have been able to make up its mind to order a revision of the Dreyfus case, though all the Ministers are said to be in favor of it except the Minister of War Mr. Cavaignac. Public opinion in favor of revision is strengthening, though the enemies of Dreyfus assert that it would only result in a fresh condemnation. The unfortunate Dreyfus himself is kept in complete ignorance of all that is passing. The friends of Mr. Zola are jubilant, and assert that before long he will be able to return to France the hero of the day. It is noteworthy that Generals Boisdeffre and Gonse, who have just resigned from the Staff, were two of the officers principally accused by Zola of being concerned in the injustice committed with Dreyfus. Zola evidently knew what he was talking about, and time is proving him to have been in the right.

—Another important piece of telegraphic news, is that of an alleged offensive and defensive alliance having been arranged between Gt. Britain and Germany—an announcement which is certainly a surprise if true. So far, however, little or nothing seems to be known of the details, except that one of the bases is the consent of Germany to the British occupation of Delagoa, on the east coast of South Africa, in return for which Germany will be accorded complete liberty of action in Asia Minor.

—News from the Soudan is up to the 30th ultimo, and states that skirmishing had already begun between the advance cavalry of Sirdar Kitchener's forces and the vanguard of the Derviches, at Keri, 8 miles from Omdurman. The expedition was advancing steadily, and news of a definite battle is expected any moment.

—The "Thames" took yesterday as a small but important item of her cargo, the first instalment of the anti-yellow fever serum (this is a clumsy description) prepared in accordance with the directions of Prof. Sanarelli by the Company to whom he has sold his invention. There are four lots, one for New Orleans, one for St. Vincent (W. I.) at request of the British Government, one for the Bahamas,

and one for the Spanish Government. There are plenty of demands for the serum, which the Company hopes to meet as soon as its instalments are in full working order.

—Sensation has been caused in Spain by a violent speech of General Weyler, denouncing the Government and the peace with the United States, and offering to place himself at the head of a military movement to save Spanish honor and integrity.

—General Brookes has assumed command of the U. S. forces in Puerto Rico, in place of General Miles, who returns to the States.

—Admiral Cervera and his fellow-officers will leave the United States for Spain, via Southampton, on Tuesday.

—The twice postponed Concert at the Lira Institute is now announced to take place tomorrow (Monday) evening.
