POLITICAL NOTES, About the only political event since our last, was the meeting, in Calle Rio Negro, on Sunday after-noon, of the Departmental Colonoon, of the Departmental Colorado Commission, for the purpose of deciding on the candidates for Montevideo for the approaching elections. This meeting, we are sorry to say, proved anything but harmonious. Proceedings began with a dispute over the admission of delagrates representing the Club. of delegates representing the Club of the 15th section, which had been dissolved on account of its share in the miserable mutiny of July last. The Chairman, Sr. Government is taking. This Iglesias, proved to be unable to keep order, discussion reached an angry and personal tone, violent political recriminations were in-dulged in, several motions were put and voted without there being any clear notion what they were about, and eventually the meeting broke up in admired disorder with out the real business of the day having been entered upon. Another meeting will be held to-day, which it is to be hoped will be more successful than the one recorded above. The rival lists have now been reduced to three. Perhaps it may not be a fair point for outsiders. may not be a fair point for outsiders to criticise, but we cannot help re-marking on the weakness of the lists of names presented as candidates for Deputyships. One would have thought that a party which is so pretentious as the «colo-rado» would have found men of a more representative and pro-minent character to represent it in the capital of the Republic and the head quarters of the party. We think that the «colorado» party may bless the «electoral accord» for having secured it so large a share of representation in the luture Chambers. Its decadence as a par-ty—the work of the bad men whom it has allowed to act as its leaders in recent years—daily becomes more noticeable, both in its want of organisation, its perpetual internal dissenssions, and in the quality of the candidates it brings forward. Its predominance is and for some time past has been based on false pretences, and unless it reacts much more vigorously than it has yet shown signs of doing it will be out of power before another decade has passed—and we do not think the Republic will be any the worse for the change for it has not been a success as a governing party. It certainly did not enjoy the confidence of the Republic during the last two administrations, and we seriously doubt if it does now, for although the reformatory policy adopted by it has allowed to act as its leaders

Sr. Cuestas has done something to redeem it, the Republic cannot avoid noticing that it is amongst the «colorados» them-selves that that policy meets with least support and most ob-struction. If the majority of the party had had the moral courage either to proclaim the formal expulsion of the «collectivists,» or else to form themselves into a new party with a new name, we would have had hopes of them, but so long as «collectivists, and political brigands of the type of Julio Herrera and his followers are still allowed to call themselves «colorados,» the party will always bear within itself the seeds of degeneration and disaster, and will be a menace to the Republic. The «collectivists» -we cannot say it too often -can-not be regarded as honest and legitimate politicians, and they have no place in the same party with honest, self-respecting and well-intentioned men. They are the declared enemies of law, order and morality in politics and in administration, and the rest of the «colorados» must either expel them or be content to fall with them. This choice has already been presented to them, and one of these days they will find it presented in clearer and more appreciatory terms still, and will find it presented in clearer and more peremptory terms still, and no postponement of the answer will be permitted. The Republic—whatever a few military bullies and cutthroats may choose to think—will have no more of collectivism, and if the colorados do not contrive to dispense of themselves for more of engage themselves far more effectually than they have yet done from \*collectivist\* associations, they may all have to go together. At present it is impossible to know whether the term «colorado» covers a «collectivist» or an honest man-and the two things are in radical antithesis to each other. The presidential election continues to excite discussion. According to the Siglo a new suggestion

has come forward, namely that the new Chambers should be convoked as soon as the elections are complete, which would be early in December, and should proceed immediately to the Presi-dential Election, electing Sr. Cues-tas for the term of four years. It is not explained how this is to be not explained how this is to be reconciled with the Constitutional Article that the presidential election shall take place on March 1st, the term of four years invariably dating from that day. We cannot understand why so many difficulties should be raised over a question that seems to us simple enough, as we showed in our last If it is recognised that the return to a consticognised that the return to a constitutional regime shall date from the presidential election on March 1st, the whole matter is settled without further dispute, and Sr. Cuestas can remain where he is until that date, without the dangers and inconveniences of a 15 days' interim presidency. One would really think that our contemporaries had some hidden contemporaries had some hidden object in desiring to see him out of

There is a slight recrudescence of alarmist rumors, mainly owing to the extra precautions that the Government is taking. This how-ever, is quite to be expected. As we have said before November is the month of alarms, and will be until the elections are safe-ly over. For our part, we think it reassuring to see the Government well prepared and on the alert, though some of our contemporaries seem to think otherwise.

«With respect to the wool pro-spect, it is reported that mortality among the flocks has been some what abnormal this winter owing to the heavy and continual rain and the prevalence of scab, but I trust the clip will not be inferior to that of last year, as I observe from that of last year, as I observe from reliable statistics I have in my possession that from the year 1891 the shipment of wool from the Port of Montevideo has increased by a gradual and steady development 50 per cent.


