## POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Monday, Dr. Campistegui was voted to the chair. A letter was read from Dr. J. C. Blanco resigning the Presidency of the Council, and referred to Committee. Discussion of the Municipal Budget was resumed and concluded, increases being voted in several of the items. The sitting then terminated.

After the above sitting, on the initiative of Dr. Schiaffino, an informal meeting of a number of the Councillors was held to consider the question of immediate return to constitutional government. Presentation was made of a "Minute to the Executive" drafted by Dr. Schiaffino and Sr. J. Battle. This is condensed, to the following effect: That the Council of State is desirous of cooperating to the prompt reconstruction of the constitutional powers in conformity with public opinion; that the greater number of the future legislators are now elected; that since the authority of the Provisional President to convoke the Republic to general elections has been recognized, he must have equal authority to convoke the legislators thus elected to sittings, both acts being constitutional prerogatives of his office; that public interests demand the closing of the extraordinary period and a return to regular government; for these reasons the Council of State calls on the Executive to convoke the legislators elect to preparatory sittings, and is prepared to second the movement by declaring its own dissolution.

The above Minute was very generally approved, and it is quite expected that it will receive the adhesion of a considerable majority of the Council. In that case it will be formally presented and voted before the end of the month, and thus the first step towards the solution of the problem of the day will have been achieved.

For the second time Dr. Juan Carlos Blanco has presented his resignation as President and member of the Council of State. The first occasion was just after the military mutiny of July 4, when he presented his resignation—eventually withdrawn—by way of protest against the deportation of the ringleaders. On the present occasion he sets forth as his reason the appointment of Col. Viera to the Prefecture of Salto, which he professes to regard as an attempt against the liberty of suffrage there, and therefore an act of personal opposition to his own candidature as Senator for the Department. This is rather a strained interpretation, nor is the connection between these circumstances and his position in the Council of State at all clear, for the Council had nothing to do with the appointment of Col. Viera.

However, we think it may all be set down as part of the electoral intrigue or imbroglio of which Salto is the headquarters. Dr. Blanco's fidelity to the situation has been in doubt ever since July last, and these doubts were confirmed when recently he refused to make declaration of his adhesion to the "electoral accord." He ought then to have withdrawn his candidature, knowing that the good faith of the "colorado" party was pledged to the observance of the accord, but this he did not do, and this was the origin of

all the trouble in Salto, which was magnified by the want of tact in the Government and in the "Colorado" Committee in dealing with the schism. Yesterday's *Dia* exposes the whole imbroglio in unmistakable terms. There is, it says, and the assertion is supported by known facts, a small group of "colorados," who although originally supporters of the *coup d'etat* of February and the presidential candidature of Sr. Cuestas, have recently turned round until they are now in frank opposition. The leader of this group is Dr. Blanco and its mouthpiece in the press has been the *Siglo*, edited by Dr. Blanco's brother-in-law. The object of this group has been to set aside the "electoral accord" in the clause relating to the presidency of the Republic, and, this being accomplished, to substitute the candidature of Dr. Blanco for that of Sr. Cuestas. This explains many events preceding and during the electoral period, as it also explains the attitude of the *Siglo* and its present opposition to an immediate return to constitutionality, which would be the deathblow to their plans. We cannot help regarding the explanation as a true one—that Dr. Blanco had aspirations to the presidency is no secret—and it cannot be said that it presents Dr. Blanco in a very favorable light.

The arrests made in Salto by Col. Viera are confirmed, but have not the character of first attributed to them. They were effected by order of the President himself, and the persons arrested are three military officers Col. Córdoba, Com. Chiavaro and Com. Alciatori, who are not only concerned in the intrigues which have interrupted the electoral processes there but are also shrewdly suspected of being implicated with the "collectivists." They have been ordered to the capital—a step warranted by their character as military officers—and it is to be hoped that their absence from Salto will help matters there to cool down. The electors of Salto have been far from blameless, having shown both bad faith and want of discipline and the noisy outcry they have been making must be very largely discounted, but at the same time it must be regretted that the Government has given a certain amount of color to the outcry by the proceedings of its officials.

We do not know if it is worth mentioning, but it is said that the "invasive" collectivist groups which had assembled in Entre Rios have been dissolved. Did they ever really exist?

The appointment of Col. Bernasconi to the Prefecture of the Capital is fully confirmed and will be officially published before the end of the week. The selection seems to have given uniform satisfaction.

It is stated that, in view of the solidity of the situation, the Government will shortly declare a general amnesty to all concerned in the miserable military mutiny of July 4, leaving their further punishment to the condemnation of public opinion.

**URUGUAY NORTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY.**  
The directors of the Uruguay Northern Railway Company, in their report for the year ended June 30 last, state that the gross receipts for the year, exclusive of the guarantee, amounted to \$11,603, as against \$10,514 for the previous twelve months, or an increase of \$1,089. The expenditure for the same period was \$17,707, including \$279 amount of income-tax paid on guarantee, as against \$18,123 in 1896-97, or a decrease of \$416. Excluding the amount received for guarantee, the result of the year's working of the line is a loss of \$5,424, as compared with that of \$7,609 in the previous year. Taking into account the amount of the guarantee, the gross total receipts were \$31,580, and the expenditure strictly on revenue account \$17,707, leaving a net balance of \$13,873. The available current balances are applicable for interest on advances and prior lien scrip, and for the purchase of sleepers and other necessary supplies in Uruguay. The political disturbances in Uruguay have greatly interfered with the railway business during the year under review, and the position of affairs is still unsettled. It is hoped that should matters settle down the general traffic would improve. Still, the amount of goods carried in respect of the Saladero traffic has been satisfactory, and the proprietors anticipate still better results during the season which is now commencing. The necessary requirements of the permanent way are receiving attention, and 5,984 hardwood and 5,883 creosoted pine-wood sleepers have been replaced during the year. The relations of this company with the Midland Uruguay and the North Western of Uruguay Railway Companies are most friendly. The arrangements mentioned at the last general meeting have been carried into effect, the combined management of this line and that of the North-West

ern of Uruguay being undertaken by the manager of the latter, thus securing substantial economy in working, and a more efficient service on the above railways. Reductions in the staff have also been made; so that the working expenses are now as low as it is possible to bring them with due regard to efficiency.

**Cricket.**  
**M.V.C.C. versus Buenos Aires C.C.**  
This annual fixture was played at the Blanqueras ground on Sunday and Monday, and resulted once more in a win for the visitors. At the wish of Buenos Aires, the teams played 12 men each side. The visitors won the toss on Sunday and sent their opponents to the wicket. This doubtless contributed to the defeat of Montevideo, for the rain of the previous night had made the wicket very heavy and disastrous to the batters. M. V. C. C. scored 83 for their first innings, of which Chater, who played capitally throughout the match, compiled 37. B. A. then went in, on a better wicket, and made 186, to which R. E. Anderson contributed a fine score of 86 and Syer 31. On the Monday, M. V. again went in, and with a more favorable wicket put up 120, of which Dunbar contributed 41. Unfortunately we are unable to give the score of this innings, owing to its having been taken away to Buenos Aires by mistake. B. A. followed on and made the necessary 18 for one wicket, thus winning the match by eleven wickets. On the Sunday there was a considerable number of visitors present in the afternoon. **Spain and America.**  
**THE FINAL PROPOSALS.**  
*Paris, Nov. 21.*  
The Hispano-American Peace Commission met to-day, the sitting lasting from two to three o'clock. The American presented a memorandum in which they set forth the grounds on which they base their refusal to accept arbitration.

This memorandum, which is the final proposal of the American Commission, made for the sake of immediate peace was to the effect that the United States, while compelled to insist upon the cession of the entire archipelago of the Philippines, would, if the cession should be made, pay to Spain a sum of 20 million dollars.

The American Commissioners stated that as it was the policy of the United States to maintain in the Philippines an open door to the world's commerce, they would include in the Treaty a provision to the effect that Spanish ships and merchandise should be admitted for a term of years into the ports of the Archipelago on the same conditions as American ships and merchandise.

They also offered to embody in the Treaty a stipulation for the mutual renunciation by the United States and Spain of all claims for indemnity, whether national or individual, of one Government against the other which may have arisen since the beginning of the late insurrection in Cuba and prior to the signature of the Treaty of Peace.

In the event of these proposals, with the articles heretofore provisionally agreed to relative to Cuba,

Puerto Rico, and Guam, being definitely and finally accepted with a week the American Commissioners stated that they would be ready to negotiate upon all other matters, including religious freedom in the Caroline Islands as was agreed upon in 1896; the release of political prisoners held for acts in connection with the insurrections in Cuba and the Philippines, the acquisition of the Island of Kusaie in the Carolines as a naval and cable station, and of cable landing rights at other places in Spanish jurisdiction, and the revival of the various treaty provisions heretofore in force between the two countries.

**Tesla's Electricity.**  
Tesla has certainly made electricity his obedient humble servant, if the reports are true. He can make it harmful or harmless, at will. He has not only passed a tremendous current of it through his own body without its doing him any harm in the world. With the same current, or with another, stronger still, he says he can destroy whole navies, at any distance from an operating base. And he works as completely without apparatus as any other modern conjuror. At any rate, he needs no wires. His miracle, according to the "New York Herald," enables one man to control and direct with absolute exactitude the movements of any type of vessel, balloon, or land vehicle, at any distance. Thus a ship may send out a torpedo boat, may submerge it if desired, and steer it without cable or wire against a hostile vessel's side. Unerring certitude of aim is not required. It is not necessary to touch the spot. There or thereabouts will do. "There is no reason," he says, "why we should not load a vessel with 200 or 300 tons, or even more of dynamite which, exploded even a mile or so away, would raise a wave that would overwhelm the biggest ship ever built." His discovery, he thinks, comes in the very nick of time to put France on an equality with England on the seas. At the forthcoming Paris exhibition he intends to exhibit a model of a vessel all the manoeuvres of which will be directed by him from his office in New York. It would be interesting to know if he means to disdain the cable in transmitting his force.—*Exchange.*

**SUNDRIES.**  
—Some sensation and not a little amusement has been caused here by the news telegraphed from Buenos Aires of a decidedly undignified "scrimmage" that occurred on Monday night between the ex-dictator Col. Latorre and the ex-president Dr. Julio Herrera. Both were guests at a ball given by the "Circulo Italiano," at which the officers of the German cruisers were also present. Meeting face to face in the ball-room, when it was full of people, Col. Latorre pushed Dr. Herrera aside and struck him. According to one account Dr. Herrera, who does not seem to have recognized his aggressor, returned the blow; and according to another Col. Latorre was knocked down by Dr. Borghini, President of the Circulo. Col. Latorre, who had his draughtier with him, then withdrew. So did the German officers, who must have formed a high opinion of the manners and customs of Uruguayan ex-presidents. Col. Latorre is certainly much to blame for a public aggression of this character, which shows a lamentable want of culture, at the same time, putting aside political questions, the character of Dr. Herrera, although he has been a president, is not one to justify his appearance in the society of honorable men and respectable women. It is expected that a duel will be the result.

—The Annual General Meeting of subscribers to the British Episcopal Church will be held at the Consulate on the afternoon of Thursday the 29th instant.

—An American friend confirms our statement that in the United States the prohibition of immoral spectacles is extended to their public reproduction by means of the cinematograph or biograph. In several States where attempt was made to give cinematograph exhibitions reproducing a prize fight, the authorities not only prohibited the spectacle, but confiscated and destroyed the films. This, in our opinion, is what ought to be done with the biograph representations of the bull fights at present being shown here.

One need only watch the unusual excitement the spectacle produces among the audience to be convinced of the immoral and degrading effect of the spectacle.

—Good news for the lovers of good opera—of which there was practically none last season. Sr. Crodara has engaged the Sansone Company, at present performing in Buenos Aires, and it will perform in the Solis

Theatre next month. The Company is a high class one in every respect. Unfortunately the weather will be rather hot for opera. It is to be hoped the managers will do something to improve the ventilation of the Theatre before the occasion, for as a rule it is intolerably stuffy.

—An enterprising Frenchman has commenced building a large summer theatre or café chantant on a site in Calle Florida between Soriano and Canelones, one square from the Plaza Independencia, and hopes to have it ready for opening with a French operetta company about February. We also hear that there is every probability of arrangements being completed for the rebuilding of the Politeama Theatre on its former site in Avenida Paz, corner of Colonia. It must be nearly four years since this Theatre, the most popular Montevideo ever had, was burnt to the ground, and the site has remained vacant ever since.

—Mr. L. J. Gregory, R. A., has been elected President of the Royal Institute of Painters in Water Colours.

—The authority of the Bishop of London is cited by the Church News Agency for stating that the questions which have arisen in connection with Mr. E. T. Hooley's gift of gold Communion Plate to St. Paul's Cathedral have been happily settled, the cost of the plate having been paid to the Official Receiver by donors who desire to remain anonymous.

—We read in a London paper:—For the Imperial Penny Postage to come into operation on Christmas Day it is not intended to produce any special stamp, and Somerset House can meet the increased demand out of its large reserve. The Controller is authorised by law to keep a stock of ten millions' worth in the various strong rooms on the Thames Embankment, and lest the outbreak of fire should by any mischance destroy the stock, they are divided among several separate parts of the great building, just as it is usual to separate a stack of gunpowder into several small detachments. The explosion of a powder magazine would create hardly more topsy-turvyism in the world around than a general flare up of our whole stock of postage stamps. Postage stamps are not made at Somerset House, though at one time they were all brought there to be perforated. Messrs. De la Rue and Co. are the contractors. Our present set of stamps were adopted in January, 1887, and no forgeries have ever yet been known.

—A newly-elected director of a provincial railway company the other day, when the subject came up at a board meeting of making a contract for fish-plates, expressed the opinion that the employees of the company should provide crockery for themselves!

—The new Dutch postage stamps, which were issued in honour of the young Queen's attainment of her regal majority, have all been recalled from circulation. It appears that "Onz' Vilemijnje" is very much displeased at her portrait on the new postage stamps, and upon the ground that the ungallant and disloyal engraver has made her look ten years older than she really is. It may be remembered that about six years ago, when Queen Wilhelmina was in her twelfth year, a new series of postage stamps was also cancelled on account of the Royal maiden's displeasure. The fault of the engraver on that occasion, however, was precisely contrary. The Queen complained that he had made her look too childish! In both cases, it seems, the engraver's treatment of the hair—a point on which the Queen is very particular—has been responsible for her Majesty's appearances as "far too young" and as "far too old."

—A fearful accident occurred on Monday afternoon in a small house in Calle Nueva York 20, occupied by a married woman named Maria Rolandi. She went on the roof to hang out some clothes to dry, leaving her baby, six months old, in the cradle, under the care of a neighbour's child, a motherly little girl of 31 On her return within ten minutes, the mother found the cradle enveloped in flames, and the unfortunate infant was so badly burnt that he died within an hour. The child in charge was too terrified to give an explanation, but it is imagined that she must have found some matches and been playing with them.

Even as she spoke, she drooped helplessly against him, whether in sleep or unconsciousness Ingram was not sure.

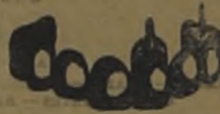
She cleared a hard, shiny sofa, that she might lay the slight figure he carried upon it.
