# LETTERS FROM THE BRITISH CONSULATE

(Corrected every Monday)

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## LATEST FOREIGN NEWS

London, June 16.

The Emperor Frederick died at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. During the night the weakness increased so much that those members of the Imperial Family who had left the Castle were summoned to return. The Emperor watched by the sick bed to the last. Towards morning the breathing of the patient became very laboured. When it was evident that the end was near the Imperial Family were summoned, and by 8 o'clock all had gathered round the death-bed. One of the Court Chaplains administered the last sacrament. His Majesty died without a struggle, surrounded by all the members of his family.

Directly the news of the Emperor's death was known in Berlin the bells of the city were tolled, mourning flags were displayed, and the busts of his Majesty in the shop windows were veiled in crape. Many of the shops were closed.

In Parliament feeling allusion to the death of the Emperor Frederick was made in the House of Lords by the Marquis of Salisbury and the Earl of Kimberley, and in the House of Commons by Mr. W. H. Smith and Sir W. Harcourt. On Monday an address to the Crown and to the German Emperor expressive of deep sorrow will be moved by Lord Salisbury and Mr. W. H. Smith.

In the House of Lords yesterday Lord Mageramorne informed the Earl of Meath that the talks of timber in Piccadilly-circus had been placed there to keep the power of the Metropolitan Board of Works over the spot, until something was done which would be a credit to what he considered one of the best spaces of London. The Rochester Bishopric and other Bills were advanced a stage.

The House of Commons held a morning sitting. The National Debt (Supplemental) Bill was read a third time. In Committee on the Local Government Bill, Mr. Hennessy moved an amendment providing for the transfer of the control of the police to the country councils. This was opposed by Lord Lyngton, Mr. Matthews, and Mr. Ritchie, and supported by Mr. Gladstone, Sir G. Trevelyan, and Mr. H. Flower. On a division it was rejected by 251 votes to 218, a majority of 33. At the evening sitting Sir R. Lethbridge's motion for an inquiry into the case of Mr. Taylor, late Commissioner of Prisons, was discussed and defeated by a large majority. The Customs (Wine Duty) Bill was considered in Committee.

A letter from Mr. Gladstone was read at the annual meeting of the London University Liberal Association yesterday, expressing a hope that the University will be able to redeem the character of our Universities from the charge of political narrowness, in respect to what, in the great Irish question, is the cause of humanity, justice, reason, and union.

The Royal Commission on the working of the Metropolitan Board of Works met again yesterday, Lord Herschell presiding. Mr. Kent, a builder who has had transactions with the Board, admitted having given money to Mr. Robertson, Mr. Haigh, solicitor to Mr. Robertson, was examined. Mr. Legge was questioned with reference to the Yorkshire Grey public-house, and he also said that he had given money to Mr. Robertson. The Board of Works, at their meeting yesterday, resolved to dismiss Mr. Goddard.

Evidence as to the effect of the sweating system in the furrier and cabinet-making trades was given before Lord Dunraven's Committee yesterday, and the opinion of more than one witness was taken as to the immigration of foreign paupers.

Our New-York Correspondent telegraphs that Walt Whitman is worse, and that his friends are much alarmed. At Ascot yesterday Minton won the Hardwicke Stakes, Timothy the Alexandra Plate, Link-Bay the Windsor Castle Stakes, and Attila, the Ascot High Weight Plate. The Wokingham Stakes fell to Annamite, the Queen's Stand Plate to Noble Chieftain, and the Thirty-fifth Triennial Stakes to Italia.

Mr. Justice Butt yesterday ruled that a writ of attachment must issue against Captain Welch, commander of the Royal boats at Virginia Water, for aiding and abetting his son, Mr. Vernon Welch in his disobedience to the order of the Court requiring him to deliver to Mrs. Vernon Welch one of the children of the marriage. Under the circumstances, Mr. Justice Butt said he would not send Captain Welch to prison for an indefinite time.

An action in which Mr. Hart, a book-maker living in Bedford-square, sought to recover a sum of more than 7,000c from Captain Wetherell and another, the claim arising out of betting transactions, came on for hearing in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, and had not concluded at the rising of the Court.

A youth named Shirley otherwise Richardson, was accused before the Clerk-enwell magistrate yesterday of breaking into premises at Farringdon-road during the previous night, and presenting a revolver at one of the detectives who arrested him. The facts having been given in evidence, a remand was granted.

## THE NEW EMPEROR

(From the Daily News)

The new German Emperor—William the Second—successors to a great inheritance is always a great responsibility. In this instance the responsibility is especially great. The German Empire is made, but it might, by conceivable possibility, be unmade. It has taken root, but its roots have hardly yet struck so deeply into the soil where it is planted that they might not possibly be torn from the earth again. In such conditions it is but natural that the eyes of the world should turn with the keenest and the profoundest interest on the young man into whose hands the great charge has so suddenly been given. The new Emperor succeeds young to the Imperial throne. His father had passed middle age when he came for a brief moment to the cares and responsibilities

of the Imperial state. His grandfather was an old man when he was proclaimed German Emperor. In the Versailles Palace, of which his victories had made him an inmate. The present Emperor is young, is just under thirty years of age. Probably there never were in the same short space of time so many changes in the ownership of an Imperial crown. There are at the present moment three German Emperors living. The new Emperor is admitted on all sides to be a man of ability, of remarkable abilities and experience, and of genuine force of character. He has shown a truly German love for practical as well as theoretical education. He is a born soldier, but he has followed the example of the Prussian Kings, his ancestors, and had himself well drilled into the business of the Civil Service as well. If he should fall in any way to make his rule a success for himself and a steady satisfaction to his country, it certainly will not be for lack of well-disciplined training in the work of a German Sovereign. According to all accounts, he has shown an omnivorous eagerness to acquire a mastery of the military and the civil exercises proper to his position. He is said to be a devoted follower of Prince Bismarck, and many auguries of evil have been drawn from this fact alone. He is said to have a somewhat "masterful" temperament for all his devotion to the great Chancellor, and there are rumours that he has an ambition and an adventurous spirit and a faith in the conquering destiny of his family and his country, which might lead him into enterprises of somewhat too great pith and moment in the political affairs of the Continent. Too much importance need not, however, be given to these reports. Even if they were all true, the world need not therefore take alarm for the future. The new Emperor would not be a Hohenzollern at all if increased responsibility did not bring with it for him an increased sense of the need of self-restraint.

No one could have come to the throne in Germany with a much less promising record than the first Emperor William when he succeeded his brother as King of Prussia. He came to the throne feared and disliked by the great majority of his people. We have all seen how he ended—the homage and affection of a thankful people surrounding his dying bed. The late Emperor, indeed, had no such early feeling to fight against. He was known to be a great soldier, who nevertheless loved not war but peace. He had no time allowed to him to show how he could guide the destinies of his country; but we cannot think that his resolute desire to maintain peace where peace could honourably and safely be maintained will fail to have its influence on the policy of his son. The speech of the new Emperor himself, delivered not long since at the dinner of the Brandenburg Provincial Diet, contained the earnest expression of a hope that Heaven would always preserve him from such criminal levity as a thoughtless inclination for war and an craving for glory. There has been already warlike glory enough acquired by the Hohenzollerns, one might think, to satiate or render superfluous the ambition of generations of Princes. Besides, we cannot exactly regard any Sovereign of the German people to-day as a sort of Attila raving for war or even as a gorging Alexander thinking only of new worlds to conquer. Not Amurath an Amurath succeeds, but German William German Frederick. There is no oneness of evil to be drawn from the great German Minister. Prince Bismarck has made great wars; but he has not warred for the sake of the love of war. When all the rest of Europe, even we are sorry to say, our own England, under mistaken leadership, was clamouring for sides to be taken in a new Eastern war, Germany declared through the voice of Prince Bismarck that the whole Eastern question was not worth to her the bones of a single Pomeranian grenadier. Voltaire himself might have applauded the sentiment—Voltaire, who hated war, and would not even enter into the spirit of Prince Bismarck and the new German Emperor, and admit that the soldier's might be a glorious trade.

We do not, then, recognise any increased dangers to the peace of Europe from the succession of the Emperor William II. In truth it is very easy to overrate the war-creating power of an Emperor in our days. Even a Russian Emperor has to make pretty sure of his public opinion before he embarks on dangerous enterprises. The German people, we may rely upon it, have not the slightest inclination for any war of aggression. They do indeed feel the burden of the strain of their military system. They recognise the necessity of holding to what they believe to be their own. Perhaps, if it could be made clear to them that one fierce decisive struggle could settle the question for ever, and allow them to go back to an assured peace and an exemption from militarism they might be willing, like Macbeth, to "try the last." Perhaps they might even be willing to provoke the ordeal by battle. But the Germans are far too well educated a people not to know that there are few really decisive battles in the world's history. They know that a sudden success to-day would but mean a perpetual state of preparation against the risks of a possible defeat on some future day, and we cannot suppose that the new Emperor of Germany will fail to take account in his Imperial policy of the instinct, the opinions, and the interests of his countrymen. Every year that passes after a great international quarrel is at least something of an additional guarantee that the quarrel may not be renewed. Notwithstanding all the recent evidences of an explosive temperament in France, we are still firmly of opinion that the great majority of Frenchmen desire nothing so much as peace and the consequent national prosperity. Of course we are far from saying or supposing that such sound and rational sentiments can be relied upon to control human passions in trying and excited times. We all know "how easily things go wrong" in politics as well as in love affairs. An ill-considered speech or an inconsiderate despatch, may bring two States into war. The petulant tap of

a fan led to the French conquest of Algeria. But the new German Emperor is not exactly a Day of Algiers to offer headless insult to any representative of any sentiment of a foreign people. What we know of him for certain is that he is a Prince trained in a manner beyond the average training even of Continental Europe. We in England can only wish him the full glory of a successful and a peaceful reign. We wish him this for his own sake, for his mother's sake, for the sake of his illustrious father's memory, and for the sake of the great and friendly German people, over whom he has so suddenly and sadly been called to reign.

## THE DEAD FINGER AND THE LIVING MAN.

A telegram from Delhi in the Times announces the conviction of Ganga Sahai, a famous dacoit. He was found hiding in the jungle on the Meerut side of the Jumna, and was captured after a desperate resistance. He was the leader of a powerful and daring band of highway robbers and burglars which for the past three years has been the terror of the country round. The robbers move about with astonishing rapidity, and after a successful burglary or dacoity they escape with their booty across the Jumna. Ganga Sahai has been sentenced to twelve years' rigorous imprisonment, on three separate charges—namely, of burglary in 1885, followed by an assault on a policeman in the execution of his duty, and a theft in August last from the house of a member of the ex-royal family of Delhi. Ganga owes his conviction almost entirely to the affair with the policeman. He and some of his party had made an aperture in the roof of the house of a wealthy Maharajah, through which they intended to descend and commit a burglary. Being surprised the gang scattered in every direction. Ganga Sahai was, however, arrested in his flight by a policeman, who drew his sword. The former vanquished the policeman, but not before he himself had lost a finger, lopped off with the sword. Ganga Sahai got away, but the finger was picked up, and carefully preserved in spirits of wine. At his trial this finger was produced as evidence.
