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## TELEGRAMS

(Havas Agency.)

Berlin 27.

The Emperor left to-day for Stuttgart to visit the King of Württemberg. He will go to other capitals of German States, and later to Vienna and Rome.

London 27.

Telegrams from Russia say the revolt in the Caucasus is over, and that the Emperor Abdul Rahman Khan has conquered the insurgents, led by Iskhak Khan.

The cereal harvest in France is bad, in several parts it scarcely reaches the half of former harvest.

Vienna 27.

King Luis of Portugal has just arrived here.

Buenos Aires 27.

Got closed in the second ring at 10.15.

The Club Progreso ball last night was inferior to previous ones.—Exchange on Europe weak. Commercial bill discounts, 5 to 6 per cent. Payable bills, 9 to 10 to 100.—A rise in the price of coffee is announced from Rio Janeiro.

Berlin 28.

The general denunciation to the authority of the Emperor Frederick is not believed in official circles.

St. Petersburg 28.

This winter the Court of the Czar, which will be separated for the first time from the Imperial Court and will be moved to Larko.

Jackmanville 26.

The yellow fever still continues, but it is thought the worst period has passed and the symptoms are declining. Yesterday there were 141 new cases. The total number of cases to date is 234, of deaths, 20.

London 27.

Reinforcements have been ordered to St. Paul, where the rebels are assuming a threatening attitude. General Grenville Colonel Kitchen has left hastily for the spot.

Alabama 26.

Last night there was frost in several parts.

Havana 26.

Great excitement has been caused in the city by the strike of the cigar makers. Yesterday over 500 of the strikers visited the Legation of La Argentina, "Las Cabañas" and other large factories, obliging the hands to leave their work with threats and violence. The authorities took no steps until the affair was very serious. The Governor then despatched a force of 200 men to the city. The strikers number 25,000. Four police officers are stationed at each factory to protect the buildings.

Buenos Aires 27.

A preparatory meeting of the committee for the erection of a statue to Sarmiento will be held to-day.—The Paraguayan Committee was inaugurated last night. Speeches were made by Dr. Urquiza, Juan González, General Boscá, Gómez Sánchez, and others.—A court martial will be held on the 1st of October to try the private traders, accused of having sold the private property of the Government. The Executive Power has presented to the Chamber a scheme of amortization at 4 per cent. of the bonds and also a part of the loan.—The E. also proposed an augmentation of 60 millions national dollars in the emission of paper money, and the division of the National Bank into two banks, one for the Province of Buenos Aires, and the other for the rest of the Republic.—It is telegraphed from Cordoba that the passenger train to Rosario went off the rails near Bahía Blanca. It is said there is one killed and several injured.—A Medical circle is about to be formed in Rosario.—Minister Dr. Wilde has visited San Fernando.

## FOREIGN NEWS

London, Tuesday, Aug. 28.

We learn from Calcutta that two companies of the Derbyshire Regiment and 500 Gurkhas have arrived at Gwalior. The plenipotentiaries to the International Conference on the Sugar Bounties met yesterday at the Foreign Office, under the Presidency of Baron Henry De Worms, M.P. The text of the Convention was finally settled.

The military manoeuvres at the camp at Chalons will commence to-day.

Mr. John E. Redmond, M.P., Mr. William Redmond, M.P., and Mr. Walsh, editor of the *Wexford People*, were arrested yesterday in Wexford county. Mr. J. E. Redmond and Mr. Walsh were charged with having taken part in an illegal meeting in a proclaimed district, and with conspiracy to compel Captain Thomas J. Walker not to let certain lands. Mr. W. Redmond was charged with having incited to resist the deputy-sheriff. All three were admitted to bail. The Rev. Father Kennedy was last evening lodged in Cork Gaol to undergo four months' imprisonment for promoting the Plan of Campaign. The sentence was reviewed and confirmed by the Court of Exchequer, and since then Father Kennedy's friends have daily expectation of his arrest.

A conference of Roman Catholic clergy at Drogheda unanimously passed a resolution yesterday calling for the immediate release of Mr. Dillon, on the grounds that his health is breaking down, and that his death would be a disgrace to the British nation and would estrange the English and Irish peoples. It was also resolved to support the Parnell national indemnity fund, and to recommend it to the support of the people.

A large party of over 3,000 persons, members of the Whitechapel and District Liberal and Radical Associations, with their wives and families, had an excursion yesterday to Epping Forest.

The annual Congress of the British Archaeological Association was begun at Glasgow yesterday, when the Lord Provost held a reception in the Corporation Hall.

The Foresters' annual fête took place yesterday at the Crystal Palace, where there was a large gathering.

At Lord's yesterday M.C.C. commenced a two days' cricket match against Warwickshire, and made a first innings score of 130. At Brighton, Sussex and Yorkshire each completed an innings, the former making 95 and the latter 115. At Southampton, a match was begun between Hampshire and Essex. At Portsmouth a match between Oxford and Cambridge Universities made 241 in their first innings. The match between Nottingham and Middlesex, at Nottingham, was considerably interfered with by rain. At Clifton, Gloucestershire, playing with Surrey, made a first innings score of 93, while Surrey made 261 for eight wickets.

A shocking accident befel the balloon which ascended from Olympia yesterday afternoon. In descending in Essex, Mr. Simmonds, the aeronaut, sustained such injuries to the head that he died a few hours afterwards, and of the two other occupants of the car, Mr. Myers and Mr. Field, the latter had a compound fracture of the thigh. Mr. Myers escaped without serious injury.

A labourer named Arthur Brown was charged yesterday before the Kingston County Bench with poaching, and was remanded until another poacher, John Brown, should be able to attend. Two gamekeepers captured the men early on Sunday morning, and John Brown knocked one of the keepers down, upon which the other keeper shot him in the leg. The man, who was taken to the Suburban Cottage Hospital, is said to be seriously injured.

Police-constables Mark Jenkins and Herbert Wright, of the L division, had a narrow escape early yesterday morning in arresting an armed burglar in Lambeth. Jenkins looked through the glass panel of a public-house door, and saw three men crouching behind a counter. He blew his whistle, on which they came to the door, and a shot was fired the bullet penetrating Jenkins's leather belt. The men ran away and Jenkins followed one of them, who fired at him again and subsequently fired at Wright, both shots fortunately missing their object. The man, who gave the name of Arthur Bourne, was secured and was subsequently brought up at the Lambeth Police-court and remanded, the magistrate marking the charge sheet with respect to the gallant conduct of the two constables.

The charge of the abduction of an American heiress came again before Mr. Bridge, at Bow-street Police-court, yesterday. The prisoner, Moeller, was further remanded, it being stated that the German Government intended to apply for his extradition.

At Bow-street Police-court yesterday, John Lumsey was charged with assaulting the police, and James Martin was charged with attempted rescue. With regard to the assault, Lumsey said the constable struck him. As to the alleged attempt at rescue, it appeared that though a plain-clothes constable was present he did not interfere, and Martin was apprehended in the police-station, whither he had gone, he said, to speak in Lumsey's behalf. Mr. Bridge accepted Lumsey's own recognition in 5s. for six months, and discharged Martin, advising the police not to arrest men who followed a prisoner to the police station, as it looked as if they did so for the purpose of preventing evidence from being given.

At Westminster Police-court yesterday Sydney Froud, a youth, was charged with having removed the lock-pin of the rudder of the steamboat *Bridgroom*. The steamboat left Kew heavily laden with passengers, and at twenty minutes past 8, darkness having set in, struck the piles of New Battersea Bridge, owing to the steering gear having been tampered with. There was great alarm among the passengers. Mr. d'Eyncourt remanded the prisoner, and said he should require substantial bail.

Sir James King, Lord Provost of Glasgow, received a letter from the Queen yesterday, expressing her great gratification at the very cordial and loyal recep-

tion accorded to her by the citizens of Glasgow on her recent visits to that city.

The Dublin *Gazette* of last night contains several proclamations under the Criminal Law and Procedure (Ireland) Act.

The Birmingham Musical Festival opened yesterday with the performance of Mendelssohn's *Elisabeth*. Dr. Richter was the conductor. The principal vocalists were Miss Anna Williams, Madame Albani, Madame Trebelli, Madame Patey, Mr. Bentley, Mr. Lloyd, Miss Ambler, Mr. Piercey, Mr. Brereton, and Signor Foll. At the evening concert Dvorak's *Slavatic* Mass was performed.

Rain fell heavily yesterday in London, and over the country generally. Serious damage to crops ensued.

A report upon the last experiments with the Maxim machine gun and the new rifle was issued at Aldershot.

The rain yesterday greatly interfered with cricket. The match at Southampton between Hants and Essex ended in a draw.

At York Races yesterday the following were the results:—Lonsdale Plate, Mr. T. Jennings, Jun.'s *Hermis*; North of England Biennial Stakes, Sir H. Jardine's *Stronvar* w.o.; Bradgate Park Stakes, Mr. Evans's *Glendalough*; Great Breeders' Produce Stakes, Lord Londonderry's *Wenonah*; Yorkshire Oaks, Mr. D. Baird's *Bhair-root*; Zealand Stakes, Mr. Pickers-gill's *Forbidden Fruit*; Haminton Place, Mr. J. Joicey's *Beckenhall*.

Mr. H. J. King, of Croydon, carrying on business in Milton-street, London, was drowned yesterday at Falmouth, by the capsizing of a boat.

At Birmingham yesterday, two men were executed; one, Daniels, for the murder of his sweetheart, and the other, Jones, for the murder of his child.

At the Guildhall Police-court yesterday F. M. R. Casey was again brought up, charged with having stolen bonds to the value of 10,800l., the property of Messrs. Alexander Wilson and Son, and other bonds valued at 1,904l., the property of Messrs. Schaap and Hillburn. The prisoner was committed for trial.

At Greenwich Police-court yesterday, Frederick Morgan was charged on remand with having assaulted Police-constable Stocker. The prisoner was stated to have clung to some railings as he was being taken to the station, and the police then used their truncheons to make him let go. Mr. Fenwick discharged the prisoner, saying he had been sufficiently punished, and marked the charge-sheet that Police-constable 220 M had used his staff without sufficient justification.

An inquest was held yesterday at the Cottage Hospital, Surbiton, on the bodies of Major Hare and Gordon Hare. The former, a retired army officer, was shot by the latter, his son, on Sunday evening, and the murderer immediately shot himself. The jury found that Major Hare was wilfully murdered by Gordon Hare, who afterwards committed suicide whilst in a state of unsound mind.

In London last week 2,401 births and 1,433 deaths were registered. Allowing for increase of population, the births were 300 and the deaths 115 below the average numbers in the corresponding weeks of the last ten years. The annual death-rate per thousand from all causes, which had been 15.9, 18.0, and 16.2, in the three preceding weeks, rose again last week to 17.5. During the first eight weeks of the current quarter the death-rate averaged 16.2 per 1,000, and was 4.7 below the mean rate in the corresponding periods of the ten years 1878-87. The deaths registered last week in 28 great towns of England and Wales correspond to an annual rate of 18.1 per 1,000 of their aggregate population.

The half-yearly meeting of the General Steam Navigation Company was held yesterday at the Cannon-street Hotel, Mr. J. H. Tritton presiding. The report, which recommended a dividend at the same rate as six months ago, was agreed to.

Thursday, August 30.

The executive committee of the South Wales and Monmouthshire Liberal Association held a special meeting at Cardiff yesterday, and passed a resolution expressing condolence with Mrs. Henry Richard, and appreciation of Mr. Richard's great services on behalf of Wales. It was also decided to form a Parnell Defence Fund for South Wales and Monmouthshire. The committee afterwards adopted a series of suggestions that a Welsh National Council should be formed to reflect Welsh national and Liberal feeling, that the attention of Liberal members for Wales should be called to the necessity of constituting themselves a Welsh party in the House, and that such a party should be recommended to appoint a whip or whips.

Our Cairo Correspondent telegraphs that severe fighting has taken place near Wady Halfa, a fort which was captured by the Dervishes being recaptured by the troops. The enemy lost more than 100 men. The Egyptian loss was 16 men killed and 29 wounded, including two officers.

A telegram from Pietermaritzburg states that the rising in Zululand is virtually terminated, and that the troops are returning to their quarters.

The Queen has been pleased to confer a baronetcy upon Sir C. Tupper, and orders of distinction upon Sir Lionel West and other gentlemen, in recognition of their services at the recent Conference on North American Fisheries.

Dr. Hubert Parry's new oratorio, *Judith*, was performed at the Birmingham Musical Festival yesterday with considerable success. Madame Patey, Miss Anna Williams, Mr. Lloyd, and Mr. Santley took the principal parts, and at the end Dr. Parry had an enthusiastic reception. Sir Arthur Sullivan's *'Golden Legend'* was given in the evening.

It will be seen from a statement just published that down to eight o'clock yesterday morning the aggregate rainfall in London for the present month was about half an inch in excess of the average. The showers which fell during the day must have materially added to the excess.

The cricket matches between the Past and Present of Oxford and Cambridge Universities and the Australians at Portsmouth, Gloucestershire and Surrey at

Clifton, and Nottingham and Middlesex at Nottingham were each drawn yesterday. Yorkshire defeated Sussex at Brighton by three wickets.

At York yesterday Mr. Sanderson won the Great Ebor Handicap with Nappa, Mr. Whipp's Tommy Tittlemouse coming in second, and Mr. Peck's Hungarian third. Mr. G. Swanwick, Jun., won the Lonsborough Plate with Forbidden Fruit; Mr. E. Lascelles the Prince of Wales's Stakes with Nunthorpe; Mr. T. Green the Falmouth Plate with Choufleur and Mr. Joicey the Rous Stakes with Golden Fleece.

Mr. J. H. Harrison, coroner for the Eastern Division of Essex, held an inquest at Maldon yesterday on the body of Mr. Simmonds, the aeronaut. Evidence was given as to the manner in which the balloon descended at Ulting on Monday. Dr. Outeridge attributed death to a fracture of the base of the skull. The depositions of Messrs. Field and Meyers, who accompanied Mr. Simmonds was also taken. Mr. Meyers thought that when the balloon first bumped, Mr. Simmonds was holding the wrong rope. Ultimately the jury returned a verdict of 'Accidental death.'

Major J. C. Gant, of Willow Hurst, Chiddingfold, Sussex, appeared before Mr. Bridge at Bow-street yesterday to answer a summons charging him with assaulting Mrs. Louisa Gant, his daughter-in-law. The complainant had instituted divorce proceedings against the defendant's son and had obtained a judicial separation. An order, affecting the defendant, as to the custody of the children had also been made, and it was alleged that when the complainant went to the Constitutional Club to serve the defendant struck her with an umbrella. After hearing the evidence the magistrate adjourned the case.
