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

its first meeting yesterday at the Royal Courts of Justice. The Commissioners are Sir James Hannen, President of the Probate, Admiralty, and Divorce Division; Mr. Justice Day, and Mr. Justice Smith. Sir James Hannen presided, and in opening the Court stated the scope of the inquiry and the principles on which the Commissioners proposed to conduct it. Sir C. Russell, Q.C., M.P. (who, with Mr. Asquith, M.P., appeared for Mr. Parnell and his colleagues), made several applications—one for the inspection of the originals of the letters read in the action of O'Donnell v. Walter; another for the discovery of documents upon which the charges had been made; and another for the release of Mr. Dillon on bail.

The first and second of these three applications were granted, a discussion of considerable length taking place upon the second, which was objected to by Mr. W. Graham, who, with the Attorney-General (not present), represented the Times. The order relating to the discovery of documents applies to both sides; but a question will arise whether there should be any restrictions, and the Court will take upon itself to consider what documents it would be right to produce. Particulars are to be given as to the persons against whom the charges and allegations are made. Both sides are to furnish particulars and affidavits a week before Oct. 20, when the inquiry will be commenced. With respect to Mr. Dillon, the President stated that the order for his release, on his own recognisances, would be delivered on the 15th of October, it being an understanding that the hon. member would take part in no public proceedings other than those connected with the Commission.

The Mayor of St. Denis has distinguished himself by overcoming the combination formed by the bakers at that town to unduly raise the price of bread. He fixed a tariff, and arranged for an ample supply of loaves to be available within 24 hours' notice. The ring has consequently given in, and all the bakeries are at work again.

Lord Herschell took the chair yesterday at the quinquennial festival of the Royal Albert Asylum for Idiots and Imbeciles of the Northern Counties, held at Lancaster. A new recreation hall was opened.

The International Geological Congress was opened last evening in the theatre of the University of London, Burlington Gardens, Professor Prestwich presiding.

A public meeting in promotion of the establishment of a technical and recreative institute for Hackney was held last evening in the Hackney Town-hall.

A cricket match, South of England v. Australians, was begun at Hastings yesterday. The Australian team concluded their first innings for 24.

The coroner's inquiry into the circumstances of the murder of Mrs. Nicholls, at Whitechapel, was resumed yesterday by Mr. Wynne E. Baxter, at the Working Lad's Institute, Whitechapel-road. Further evidence was taken, and a juryman warmly expressed the opinion that the Home Secretary should have offered a reward. The inquest was adjourned until Saturday.

A charge of riotous throwing was made yesterday at the Marylebone Police-court against William Martin of Holloway-road, by Winifred Brown, a governess. The fact was admitted. It was stated by Detective-inspector Miller that since Christmas a hundred cases of the kind had been reported to the police in that neighbourhood. The prisoner was remanded.

Mr. Gladstone has accepted the invitation of the Mayor of Birmingham to a public reception on the occasion of his visit to that town to attend the annual meeting of the National Liberal Federation.

Mr. Dillon, M.P., was unconditionally released from Buncall Gaol yesterday morning, and arrived in Dublin early in the afternoon. He was met at the railway station by the Lord Mayor and other members of the Irish party, and was driven amidst the cheers of a large crowd to Dr. Kony's residence, and subsequently to his own house, before which bands paraded in the evening. In response to repeated calls, Mr. Dillon made a speech. Mr. Parnell has forwarded a congratulatory telegram to him, saying that his release has removed a load of anxiety from the minds of his friends.

A Scottish Home Rule demonstration took place in Glasgow yesterday. Mr. Hunter, M.P., presiding, and a resolution was unanimously adopted in favour of a leaflet sitting in Scotland, with full control over all purely Scottish questions, and with an executive government responsible to it and to the Crown.

Mr. Woodall, M.P., spoke at Eton yesterday on the Report of the Royal Commission on the Education Acts, and said that if the country should be seriously asked to reconsider the compromise of 1870, he thought the final solution of the problem would not be in the direction of a strengthening of the denominational position.

Our New York Correspondent telegraphs that the reception of Senator Sherman's resolution, directing the Committee on foreign relations to report upon such measures as may be expedient to promote friendly intercourse between the United States and Canada, is regarded as an indication that the Senate will not pass the Retaliation Bill.

The Portuguese Colonial Minister discusses the position of Portugal in South and Central Africa in a letter addressed to the Geographical Society of Lisbon. The port of Lorenzo Marques continues to be Portuguese because, says the Minister, the national will is resolute on this subject, and is supported by international law. He adds that the Zambezi, the Shire, and other affluents of the great river and Lake Nyassa offer the best means of penetrating into the interior.

Last night the Moore and Burgess Minstrels entered upon their twenty-fourth year at St. James's Hall. There was a large audience, to whom Mr. Moore made a short address.

An accident of an alarming nature happened on London and North Western express between Wigan and Warrington,

on Monday night, owing to the breaking of the axle of a fish van. Fortunately no passenger was hurt.

At the Leicester autumn meeting yesterday the racing resulted as follows:—Gosport Plate, Lord Penrhyn's Red Palmer; Village Nursery Plate, Mr. E. At the Central Criminal Court yesterday the grand jury ignored the bill against William Barber, charged with the wilful murder of Annie French at Walthamstow.

At the Thames Police-court yesterday, Charles Ludwig, a German, who appeared not to understand English, was charged with being drunk and threatening to stab Alexander Finlay. The prisoner had displayed a long knife, and a razor and a pair of scissors were found on him. It was further stated by the police that he had been in a dark court with a woman, who screamed, and that on a constable arriving she said the prisoner had frightened her by pulling out a long knife. He was remanded.

In London last week 2,485 births and 1,331 deaths were registered. Allowing for increase of population, the births were 217 and the deaths 77 below the average numbers in the corresponding weeks of the last ten years. The annual death-rate per thousand from all causes, which had been 17.5, 16.4 and 16.0 in the three preceding weeks, rose again last week to 16.2. During the eleven weeks ending on Saturday last, the death-rate averaged 16.2 per 1,000, and was 3.8 below the mean rate in the corresponding periods of the ten years 1878-87. The deaths registered last week in 28 great towns of England and Wales corresponded to an annual rate of 17.7 per 1,000 of their aggregate population.

London, Thursday, Sept. 20.
The Queen has sent to Sir W. Barttelot, M.P., a message of sympathy, on the death of his son, Major Barttelot, in Africa.

A conference of delegates from Dissenting Liberal Associations was held at Bradford yesterday. Mr. Powell Williams, M.P., presiding. A letter from the Marquis of Hartington was read, in which he expressed his belief that everything which had occurred since the rejection of the Home Rule measures had tended to confirm the soundness of the judgment which had inspired the action of Liberal Unionists in maintaining firmly the alliance of the two sections of the Unionist party. Letters were also read from Lord Derby and Mr. T. W. Russell, M.P.

At an evening meeting Mr. Chamberlain was the principal speaker. He compared the leaders of the Liberal party to the Girondins, whom Carlyle termed the pellets of the Revolution. He denied that with the present legislation in behalf of the Irish tenants there could be unjust evictions in Ireland. The right hon. gentleman said he was glad of the release of Mr. Dillon, but some persons believed that, honest as Mr. Dillon was, he had done more mischief and brought more misery on the people of Ireland than he would have done if he had been the greatest criminal.

The celebration of the recent incorporation of the town of Chelmsford took place yesterday, under the presidency of the provisional mayor, Mr. F. Whitmore, and in the presence of the Mayors of Harwich, Colchester, Maldon, and West Ham. The town was densely crowded with visitors from neighbouring places. The charter of incorporation was read from the Corn Exchange by Mr. Furbank the acting town clerk. There was public procession, and in the evening a dinner was held.

The Beauty Show was opened yesterday at Spa. A prize of 10,000 francs is to be awarded on Saturday. Our Correspondent says the competition may be pronounced a fair success.

At a Criminal Court, at Dungle, Donegal, yesterday, a man named O'Halloran was sentenced to two terms of six months' imprisonment each, on a charge of intimidation.

Considerable excitement was caused in Piccadilly yesterday by a rumor that a woman had been stabbed. It appeared that a woman had been violently assaulted and taken to St. George's Hospital, where she was detained. The man who assaulted her made his escape.

At Leicester races yesterday the following were the results:—Maiden Plate, Mr. C. Hibbert's Castilian; Mappley Selling Plate, Baron de Tuyl's Mainleam; Queen's Welter Handicap, Baron de Tuyl's Pollam; and Mr. G. Cannon's Liff; Mallow Nursery Handicap, Mr. Roberts's Carnival. At Ayr the results were as follows:—Trial Plate, Mr. J. Shepherd's Mignon; Maiden Plate, Mr. A. Hoole's Rushout; Nursery Handicap Plate, Mr. D. Jardine's King James; Selling Plate, Mr. Abington's Zigzag; Stewards' Plate, Mr. Jameson's Pompeius; Caledonian Hunt Selling Plate, Mr. Abington's Zigzag; Western Hunters Plate, Mr. R. J. Robson's Melrose.

The Australian cricketers won the match yesterday with the South of England, at Hastings, by nine wickets. The inquest into the latest of the Whitechapel murder cases was resumed yesterday, when among those who gave evidence were the man who has been spoken of as the poisoner; a woman who saw the deceased talking to a man in Haulbury-street a few minutes before she is believed to have been murdered; and Dr. Phillips, who stated that important portions of the body were missing. The inquest was adjourned till next Wednesday.

The Home Secretary has replied to the secretary of the Vigilance Committee in the House, that the practice of offering rewards for the discovery of criminals was discontinued some years ago, and that there is nothing in the circumstances of the Whitechapel murder to justify a departure from the rule.

At the Central Criminal Court yesterday, Frank Mortimer Reddington Casoy pleaded guilty to a charge of having stolen bonds to a large amount, and was sentenced to 18 months' hard labour.

The burglar Arthur Bourne, who in Lambeth shot at Police-constables Wright and Jenkins to prevent them from apprehending him, was yesterday sentenced, at the Central Criminal Court, to fifteen years, penal servitude; and Mr. Justice Charles commended the bravery of the constables, and gave them a reward of 51 each.

Mr. J. H. Johnson, of St. Ann's Warf, Limehouse, summoned the secretary of the East London Waterworks Company, at the Thames Police-court, yesterday, because the company had refused to lay on a supply of water to certain houses. Mr. Lushington heard the case at length, and imposed a fine, but on the application of the solicitor who appeared for the company he consented to state a case. Johnson remarked that this was a hardship for him, on which the solicitor said the complainant would be very sorry he had won this case by the time he got to House of Lords.

At the meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Africa, held yesterday at the Cannonstreet Hotel, the chairman, Mr. D. Pritchett Blaine, referred to the development to the gold fields in the Transvaal and adjacent territories, and said that in his opinion only mere outcrops of these important discoveries of gold had been entered upon. The report of the directors was adopted.



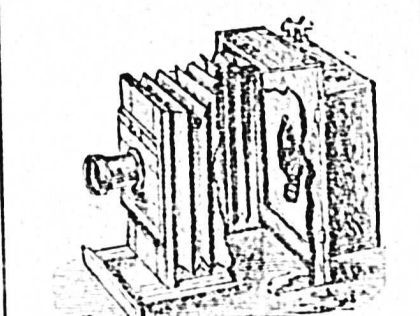
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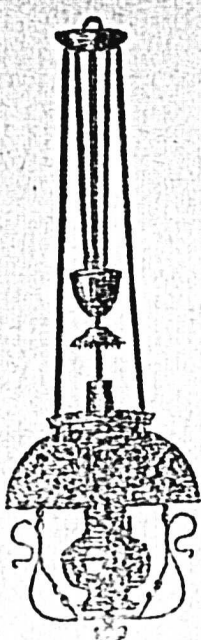
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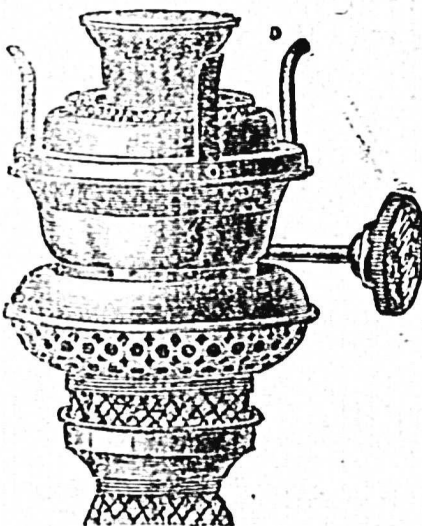
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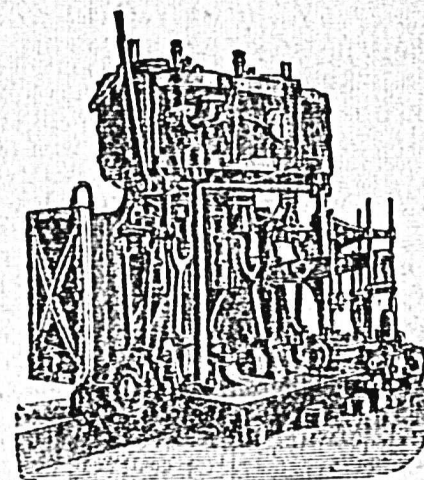
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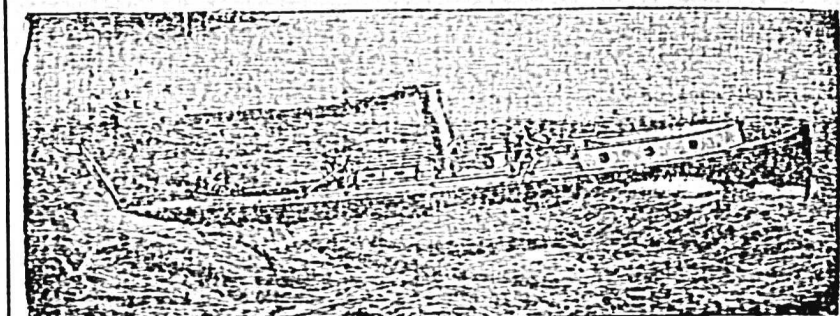
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
