AN OLD QUESTION.

The following remarks are condensed from an admirable article that appeared yesterday morning in the Siglo, an ionourable journal that understands how to distinguish between upright inlependence and organized opposition.

With few Governments has the political press, taken as a whole, been so lenient as with the present Government that obtains in constitutional monarchies, directing their strictures towards ed. This being so, we find no justificaing to certain phrases of a contemporary, said that even in the most democratie country such expressions would entail public action to teach the incautious or licentious authors the prescribed limits of morality, liberty and of respect to the supreme magistracy of the nation. On the contrary, in the United States there are no laws repressive of the liberty of the press, nor is there any precedent of Authority having prosecuted any journalist for having abused this

liberty. When will the day arrive when we will no longer occupy ourselves with these invectives that prove so irritating to certain government journals? The absolute inefficacy of personal abuse as a weapon of opposition is already proved. Even the Nacion, the governto notice the gross personal attacks of Committee sat to consider the attitude of the press, and to advise the Executive Power to imprison the writers? Since those unhappy days we have greatly advanced. There is a great difference between the angry rancour of those times and the disdainful indifference with which the public powers now regard the attacks of which the Nacion complains. It is also necessary to rerognize that these attacks are now less frequent. Both in the press and in the Chambers there is now full liberty of discussion; we are far from the epoch in which some ten or twelve Deputies, guilty of the crime of differing from opinion from the Powers had to seek their personal safety in some foreign Legation, passing thence to a steamer to

take them to Buenos Aires. The very paper of whose attitude the Nacion complains has said that we are content with very little because we have only appreciated the value of free parliamentary debates. We take this occasion to say to the paper in question (La Tribuna Ropular) that we know full well that liberty of discussion does not suffice to make a people happy, but at the same time, whoever does not attack the greatest importance to this liberty is ignorant of what constitutes political liberty and representative gov-

It seems there are amongst us those who have forgotten what has happened. Only thus can it be explained that they should say that we are much as we were .- The part is still present amongst us, and therefore, without denying that we have still far to go, let us not tire of repeating that we have already progressed considerably.



MONTEVIDEO TO BUENOS AIRES

In an article full of straight forward common-sense yesterday's Epoca calls attention to the fact that Montevideo and Buenos, the two leading cities of the River Plate, are only some forty leagues (120 miles) apart, but that the means of communication between them are still most defective, not to say by no means correspond to the greatly increased necessities.

Formerly there used to be no boat from Buenos Aire here on Fridays. By the new time table there is none on Sundays. A similar anomaly exists in the service from here there.
